

away from home.

Mrs. Falkenbery said the man told her husband he could do the work any time he chose, indicating that he need not start immediately.

Mrs. Falkenbery wants the man who engaged her husband to get in touch with her so she can get her husband's equipment. Her phone number is 843-5896.
