"No Longer Alone," winner of three film - industry awards, will be shown on October 26, at First Baptist Church in Raeford.

The film, a true story, takes a close look at a woman who was searching desperately for love and acceptance, but whose crise went. acceptance, but whose cries went unheard by those who surrounded

Originally released by World Wide Pictures in commercial theatres, the film is now one hour in length in preparation for its eventual presentation as a tele-

"No Longer Alone" traces the life of an English actress, Joan Winmill Brown. Though she skyrocketed to fame on the British state, her life was marked by a frantic grasp for personal fulfill-ment and love. Tormented by a past she was unable to forget, she succumbed to a series of nervous breakdowns; and, at one point, attempted to take her own life. In her ultimate moment of

despair. Joan was invited by a "chance" phone call to attend a Billy Graham crusade. It was here that she first discovered her worth as an individual and began her long struggle to piece her shattered life back together.

Those who have followed Billy Graham's ministry will be interested to know that Dr. Graham appears in the film in some of the footage of his 1954 London Crusade, and also in the introduction and conclusion to the film, photographed recently for this special

Cure Gourds To Last For Years

Colofrul gourds can spark fall

colorful gourds can spark fall centerpieces. And if you cure them right, they'll last for years.

So here's something you might try. As soon as you pick gourds, give them a good bath. Add a disinfectant, such as a household bleach, to the water to get rid of mold spores. mold spores.

Next, put the gourds on open shelves in a well-ventilated area for at least a month. Don't let them touch each other or sit close to a heat source. Turn them daily.

Before you use gourds, coat them with furniture polish. This pre-serves colors and helps protect

against mold growth.

If you keep gourds stored in a well-ventilated places, you can continue to use them in fall centerpieces for years.

Since the toy was introduced in 1955. 225 million pounds have been sold -- almost 700 million cans. If you haven't guessed what it is yet, here's another hint: it was created and is still being produced in Cincinnati, Ohio.

By now, you may realized that this toy is Play-Doh. It was invented by Joe and Noah McVicker. Joe's sister-in-law and her nursery school pupils complained that ordinary modeling clay was too firm for tiny fingers to mold. The problem to the drawing board and the result was the universally popular Play-Doh.

Today, the Play-Doh family still incudes the original four colors (red. blue, yellow, and white). In addition, there are four new Day-Glo colors (Signal Green, Saturn Yellow, Aurora Pink, and Blaze Orange) and playsets that range from Star Wars to Sesame Street.
