Godfrey-Upchurch Wedding Solemnized Here Sunday

On October 12 at five o'clock in the evening in Raeford United Methodist Church, Dr. Ann Swindell Upchurch became the bride of Dr. Richard Godfrey. Dr. John C. Ropp officiated for the double ring ceremony. The parents of the bride are Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Joseph Upchurch of this city and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph J. Godfrey of Dunwoody, Georgia.

A program of wedding music was presented by Mr. Chris Watkins, organist, and Mrs. Diane Upchurch Guthrie, soloist. Selections included "My Heart Ever Faithful" by Bach and "A Wedding Prayer" by Dunlap. The traditional wedding processional was played after a prelude of classical wedding music.

The church altar was decorated with an arrangement of white gladioli, fuji chrysanthemums, gypsophila, eucalyptus, and springrye fern. Seven - branched candelabra with burning tapers and mixed greens were placed on either side of the altar. Pews were marked with hurricane candles and mixed greens.

The bride was given in marriage by her father. She wore a white silk organza gown trimmed in Peau d'ange lace and pearls featuring a Cathedral train with scattered lace appliques and satin ribbon. Her cathedral - length veil of silk illusion fell from a mantilla headpiece and was covered with Peau d'ange lace and pearls. She carried a colonial bouquet of white stephanotis, white miniature carnations, gypsophila and ivy. An antique gold pendant, given by her maternal grandparents, was worn by the bride.

Dwan Swindell Upchurch, sister of the bride, served as maid of honor. She wore a gown fashioned of cornflower blue Qiana, with wide neckline, natural waist, and an accordion pleated skirt. She carried a colonial bouquet of gold and bronze chrysanthemums, apricot miniature carnations and royal blue flowers, tied with matching ribbon.

For the wedding trip the bride wore a two - piece dress of fuschia knit. The couple will reside in Garner, North Carolina.

The bride graduated from Meredith College and from the University of North Carolina School of Dentistry. The groom graduated from North Carolina State University and from the U.N.C. School of Dentistry. They plan to enter private practice of general dentistry in Garner.

WEDDING RECEPTION

Immediately following the ceremony the reception was held at the home of the bride. The dining table was covered with a Maderia cutwork tablecloth and centered with a four branched silver candelabra with the center epergne arranged with fall flowers and pale yellow tapers. The wedding cake was placed on the hunt board from which the bride and groom served the traditional first slice of cake.

Refreshments were mints, nuts, cheese straws, assorted sandwiches, ham biscuits, and punch. An auxiliary table placed on the porch contained shrimp on ice, punch, and beef slices from which the guests served themselves. A candelabra with hurricane globes and burning tapers centered this table. Lighted tapers and flowers in autumn colors were used throughout the house.

Mrs. Charles Woodfield served as matron of honor. She wore a blue gown of dotted Swiss over angel skin.

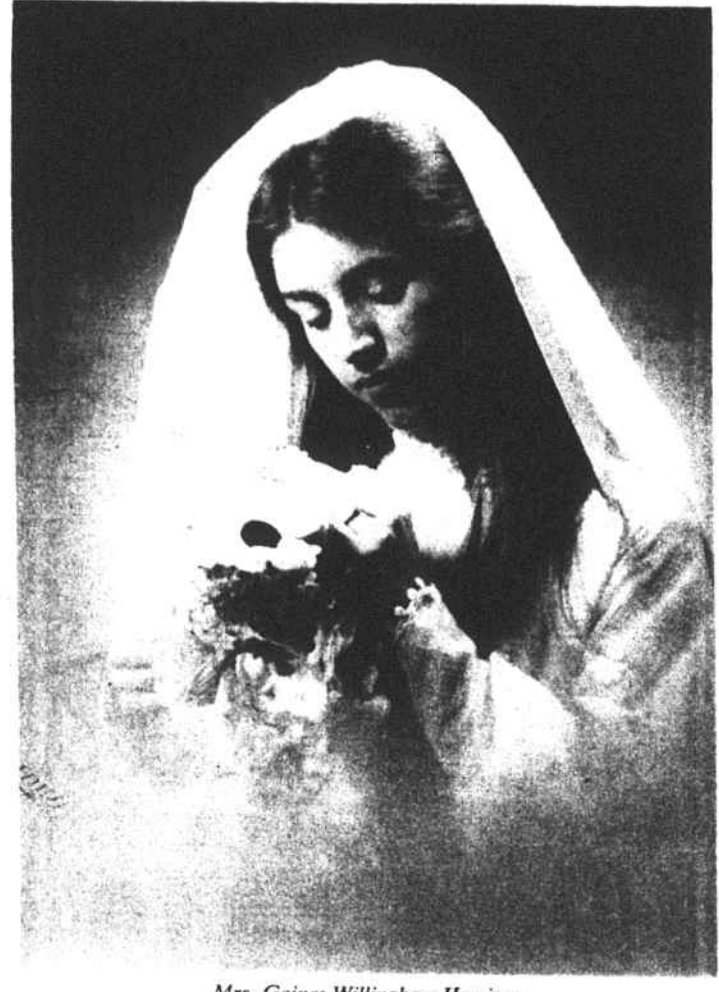
Best man was Robert Stone. James Edwin McNeill and Gaines Willingham Harrison III were ringbearers.
