Mrs. Betsy Overstreet directed the wedding.

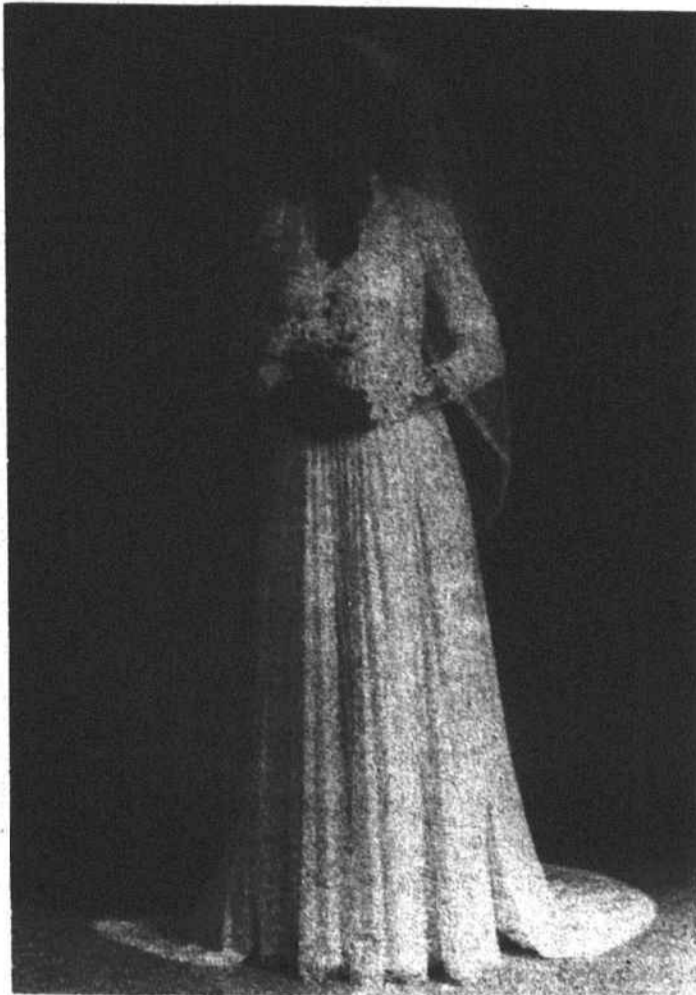
The bride is a graduate of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and is a kindergarten teacher in the Hoke County Schools.

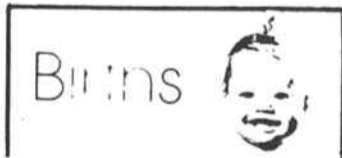
Coke Party For Miss Douglas
