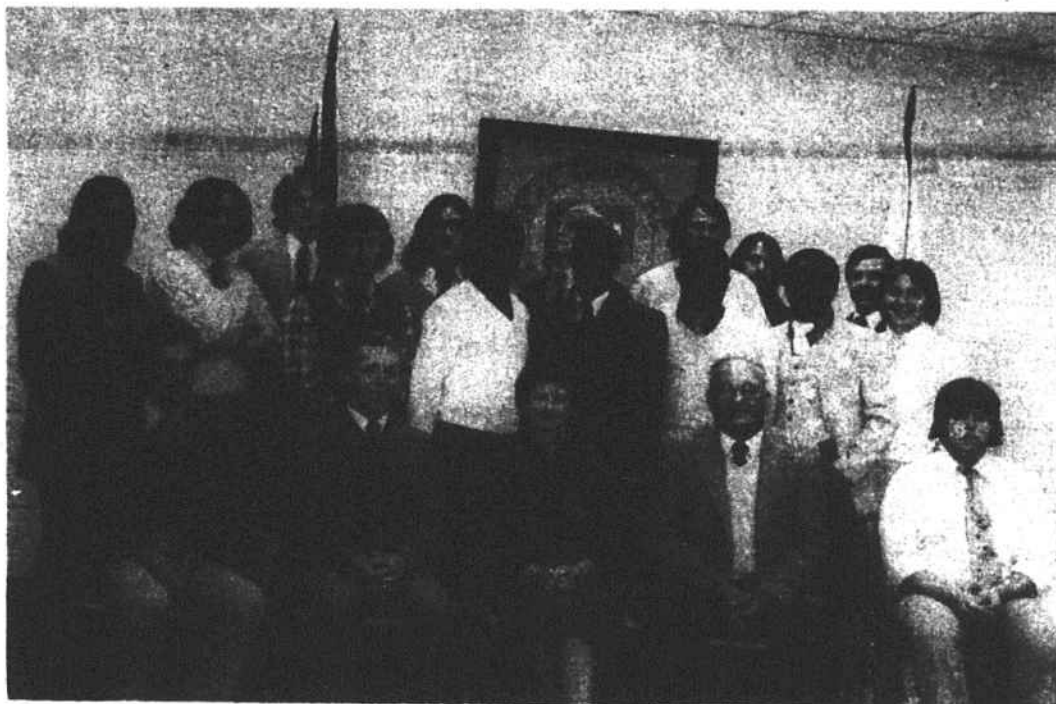

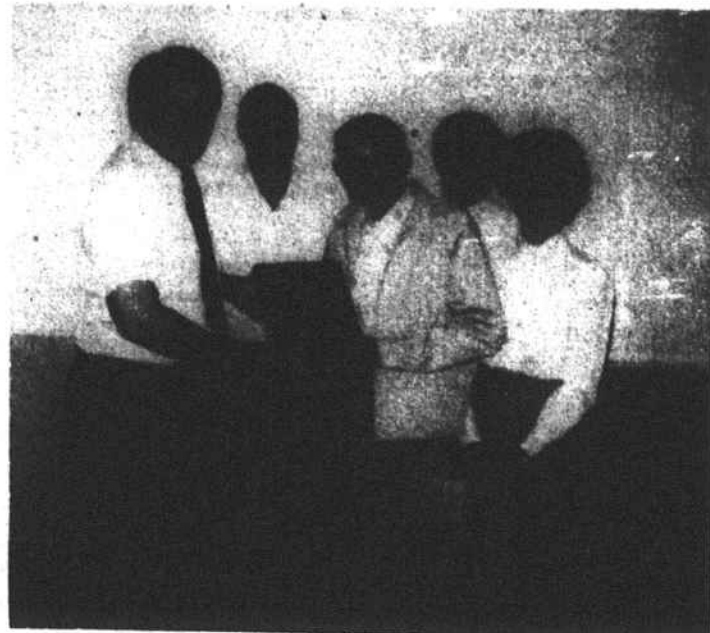

Years ago over 90% of everyone with leukemia died within six months but today the picture is much brighter for children and adults due to the research that has helped in treatment and diagnosis.

The funds will be used in North Carolina in research and patient-aid.
