Tax will drop from 2 per cent to Tax will drop from 2 per cent to 1 that Carolina Telephone customers will save approximately $\mathbf{\$} 2.5$ million on their telephone bills in
1982, according to TP Will son, the company's vice president -administration.
At 2 per cent, the company's
customers paid approximately ss million in excise tax in 1981.
In an annual process set in
motion by Congress several motion by Congress several years
ago, the tax has been declining by 1 ago, the tax has been declining by 1
per cent each January. Due to per cent each January. Due to
changes in federal legislation, the

excise tax has remained at 2 per
cent for the past two years. ent for the past two years. The levy is now scheduled to
remain at 1 per cent until Jan.1.
