

Flue-Cured Tobacco Situation: The 1981 U. S. crop sold for a record \$1.9 billion and production exceeded the effective quota. In North Carolina flue-cured output North Carolina flue-cured output of 795 million pounds was valued at over \$1.3 billion. With general yield improvement, the crop size more than utilized the carryover of quota from previous under-marketings. Seasonal prices were more than 20 cents per pound above the previous year, due to improved quality and the inflation-induced increase in price supports. During consideration of the farm

During consideration of the farm bill in the fall session of Congress, the tobacco program received heated debate. Measures to abolish the government program were narrowly defeated in both the Senate and House. During 1981, several administrative actions also impacted upon the operation of the program: (a) Stabilization Cooperatives were charged the full cost of government borrowing on CCC funds used in price support operations, (b) beginning October 1, growers were charged 0.45 cents per pound to finance grading services, and (c) the U.S. International Trade Commission voted against imposing quotas on flue-

against imposing quotas on inte-cured imposing quotas on inte-**Outlook:** The high production levels in 1981 means a negative carryover of quota into the 1982 season. On December 1, USDA announced the same basic quota of 1013 million pounds for 1982 as in 1981. This means that the "ef-fective quota" will be 12 percent below 1981.

Little increase in total use of Little increase in total use of flue-cured is projected for 1981-82. But if exports from the 1981 crop should increase slightly, it suggests that extra amounts of that quality crop may have been stockpiled, so exports in the future could be proportionately lower. Price pros-pects for 1982 depend both on the quality produced and the 12 perquality produced and the 12 per-cent increase in price supports expected. Implications: With the reduction

in effective quotas, upward pres-sure on lease rates is likely in 1982. In making their leasing decisions, growers should be carefully estimate the margin between expected tobacco price and their added cost of producing leased poundage. Then, a judgment may be made on whether the return to management is reasonable after financing the leased quote leased quota.

Income-averaging and other tax management practices should be considered by farmers with a favorable income from tobacco in 1981. With the carryover provisions of the quota system for tobacco, the good fortunes of a year such as 1981 serve to offset less favorable

conditions in other years. Farmers, like other segments of the tobacco industry, may wish to express views regarding the tobacco programs in the future. Due to the close vote in the Congress in the fall of 1981, some changes to make the of 1981, some changes to make the program more acceptible to the public may be sought. Con-gressional hearings are likely in early 1982 with comments ex-pecially solicited on means of operating the program without taxpayer costs and of assigning quotas.

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
