

Boys' Varsity Keeps Conference Lead

Hoke Beats Ross in Triple Overtime

Hoke High's varsity Bucks kept first place in the Southeastern 4-A Conference basketball standings the night of January 13 by defeating Reid Ross 80-76 in triple overtime. The Hoke girls also won, 48-34 but

the Hoke Junior Varsity lost 38-37. The games were played on the Hoke Court.

Freddie McLean and Greg Hollingsworth scored 24 points each for Hoke's boys. The victory gave

the Bucks a 3-0 conference mark and 6-5 over-all. The top individual scorer of the game was Marcus McDonald of Ross, with 34 points.

Ross pushed the game into overtime with a 22-point surge in the final period of the regular time, tying the score at 64.

The Bucks pulled it off in the third overtime by outscoring the Cougars 10-6.
