Campbell U. Choir To Sing Here

The Campbell University Choir will present a concert of sacred music at the Raeford United Methodist Church in Raeford on Sunday, January 31, at 7:30 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

The concert is a 60-minute extract from the great sacred music of five centuries, featuring the compositions of some of the world's greatest masters. The remainder of the concert is made up of selections

from early America. The choir members are the elite of the singers who comprise four choral groups at Campbell. Approximately one-half are studying to be public-school music teachers, ministers of music, professional musicians, or performing artists. To the young musicians, membership in the Campbell University Choir is a ranking campus honor, and the off-campus concerts are

high points of their college careers. This year's choir will present concerts in New York, the Carolinas and Virginia. In March they will participate in the International Festival de Musique in Quebec City, Canada.

Dr. Paul M. Yoder, the conductor, who received a Ph.D from Florida State University, is in frequent demand as a guest conductor and choral clinician.

Students Give 'Miniature Look At Raeford'

At first glance, you may think that Raeford has been encapsulated within a glass case by some strange and mysterious force.

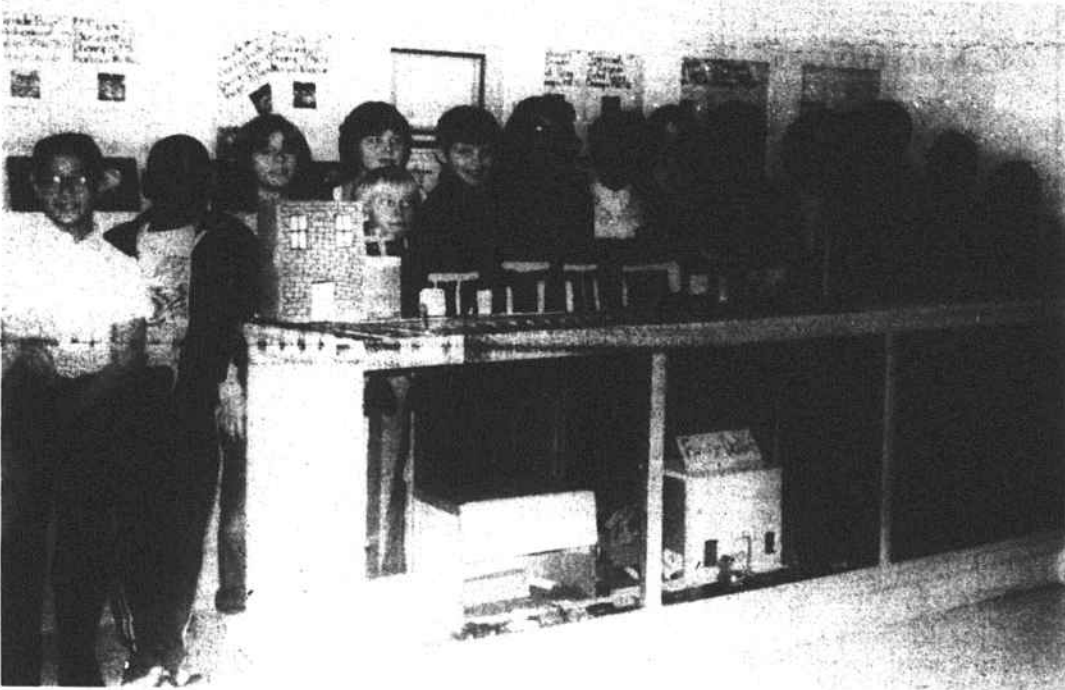
But there is nothing to be worried about, for the exploration is nothing dire whatsoever. Actually, this "Miniature Look at Raeford" is the creation of Mrs. Beverly Bowden's Sixth Grade reading class at J.W. Turlington Elementary School.

The students were inspired to construct this replica of their home town after their imaginations were triggered reading about the city of Maudurodam. Maudurodam is a miniature city in The Hague, capital of the Netherlands. All of the objects in Maudurodam are reproduced to 1/25th of life size.

The city was built about 30 years ago with funds donated by the parents of war hero George Maduro, who died in World War II.

In keeping with the spirit of Maduro, the authenticity of "little" Raeford is enhanced by such familiar sites as The Bank of Raeford, Hardee's, Theresa's, Exxon station, First Baptist Church, Cato's and Macks. Miniature cars, sidewalks, traffic signs, railroad crossings, stoplights and yes...the "wee" townfolk are also present.

The class dedicates the miniature display of Raeford to all of the fine townspeople who work together to

Mayor Proclaims February Heart Month

Raeford Mayor John K. McNeill Jr. issued a proclamation Friday designating February as Heart Month and urged area residents to support the 1982 campaign of the American Heart Association.

In the proclamation, McNeill asked for support from the residents of Raeford in the campaign against the nation's Number one killers: heart disease and stroke.

"These diseases accounted for more than 23,000 of deaths in North Carolina last year," McNeill said, "or 49% of deaths from all other causes."

"The American Heart Association urgently needs money to support research so that medicine can have a better understanding of the basic causes of heart attack, stroke and hypertension," he added.

The contributions also support professional and public education, and community service projects.

More than 30 volunteers in Raeford will join the effort to distribute Heart Association information and collect contributions, he added.

The text of Mayor McNeill's proclamation reads:

"Whereas, heart disease and stroke this year will kill nearly one million Americans, a total which exceeds all other causes combined, and

"Whereas, more than 200,000 of these victims die before retirement age, and

"Whereas, the American Heart Association is the only voluntary health agency whose sole mission is to reduce early death and disability from heart disease and stroke, and

"Whereas, the Heart Association's relentless battle against this American epidemic combined a nationwide research program, as well as improving health care in the community through professional and public education, and com-
