Marvin Stephens of Rockfish served as best man. Ushers were Vernon Stephens of Rockfish and Todd Wood of Dillon.

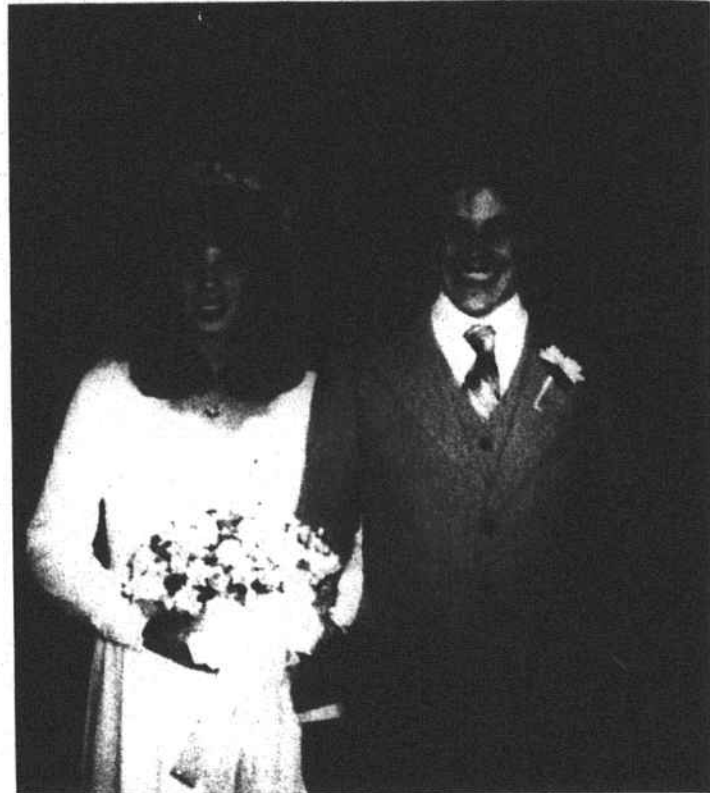

The age in which we live demands that we keep records of many things that we do. Following are two examples:

Tips on Taxes

Although April 15 is tax time, you can save money by being tax conscious all year round.

Start by keeping records of the items that you buy that will be deductible on next year's return. These might include medical expenditures, contributions and interest payments. Other possible deductibles are property, telephone or sales taxes.

Also make sure you know the requirements for supporting dependents who might count as

exemptions on your income tax return. These might include elderly parents or other children who are working and attending college.

Be sure you have records for the support you are claiming and that you provide the amount required by law.

Records for Estate Planning

You need to keep up-to-date and accurate records of your real and personal property for estate planning during your lifetime -- and for settling the estate after your death.

This means you should keep records that prove your ownership or the purchase of all types of property, including deeds for real estate and receipts of improvements that you've made to real property.

And you should keep personal property records, such as those for savings and checking accounts, stocks and bonds, business interests, debts, autos and equipment, insurance policies, household goods and jewelry. These records should spell out the date of possession or purchase and the value or price paid for each item. Store these records in a safe place.
