In Superior Court

Break-in, Assault, Escape Cases Heard

The following judgments were issued last week in Hoke County Superior Court. Judge Wally F. Bowen presided.

Gilbert McDowell, Fayetteville, breaking and entering of a motor vehicle, and larceny, three years, credited with two days spent in confinement awaiting trial.

Dwayne Ernest Beatty, Raeford, two counts of felony larceny, voluntary dismissal; defendant agreed to plead guilty to breaking and entering (one count); two counts, felonious breaking or entering, one count of misdemeanor larceny, three years, credited with 71 days spent in confinement awaiting trial, sentence suspended for three years, probation for three years, pay \$67 restitution, and court costs; felony larceny, voluntary dismissal; defendant agreed to plead guilty to breaking and entering.

Michael Wayne McDougald, Raeford, felony larceny (count two) voluntary dismissal; defendant agreed to plead guilty to breaking and entering (count one); felonious breaking or entering, and misdemeanor larceny, three years, probation for three years, \$67 restitution, and costs.

Hulane Blue, Rt. 3, Raeford, assault with a deadly weapon inflicting serious injury, pleaded not guilty by reason of insanity, charge dismissed with prejudice, based on the psychiatric report.

James Long, breaking or entering, three years suspended for three years, probation for three years, \$500 to Cornelius D. McGougan, and costs; felony larceny, count two, voluntary dismissal; defendant agreed to plead guilty to breaking and entering, count one.

William Tyrone McPhatter, felony larceny, count two, voluntary dismissal; defendant agreed to plead guilty to breaking and entering count one; breaking and entering, and larceny (two counts), and misdemeanor larceny, three years, credited with 13 days spent in confinement awaiting trial, suspended for three years, probation for three years, \$67 restitution, and costs.

Paul Ransom, breaking and entering, and larceny, three years suspended for three years, probation for three years, \$500 restitution to Cornelius McGougan, and costs.

Jerry Wayne Scott, Cumberland Mills, breaking and entering, and larceny; felony larceny, count two, voluntary dismissal; defendant agreed to plead guilty to breaking and entering, three years.

Aaron Wilson, also known as Melvin Jr. Roper, felony larceny, count two, voluntary dismissal; defendant agreed to plead guilty to breaking and entering, count one, three years, credited with 79 days spent in confinement awaiting trial, suspended for three years, probation for three years, costs.

Cleveland Alexander Patterson, felony larceny, count two, voluntary dismissal; defendant agreed to plead guilty to breaking and entering, count one; felony breaking and entering, and misdemeanor larceny, three years, credited with nine days spent in confinement awaiting trial, suspended for three years, probation for three years, \$50 restitution to Charles Averitt, \$50 restitution to William McArn, and costs.

Vollie Wendell Jones, felony larceny, count two, voluntary dismissal; defendant agreed to plead guilty to breaking and entering, count one; two counts of breaking or entering, three years.

Kent Curtis Locklear, uttering a forged instrument, voluntary dismissal; defendant agreed to plead guilty to misdemeanor larceny of a check, six to 12 months, suspended for 12 months, probation for 12 months, \$200 restitution to Charles McMillan, McMillan Food Mart, and pay costs.

Jeffrey Baldwin, felony larceny, count two, voluntary dismissal; defendant agreed to plead guilty to breaking and entering, count one; two counts of felonious breaking and entering, and one count of misdemeanor larceny, three years, credited with 62 days in confinement awaiting trial, suspended for three years, probation for three years, \$4 restitution to Charles Averitt, \$50 restitution to William McArn, and court costs.

Betty Locklear Pagan, possession with intent to sell and deliver a controlled substance, and sale and delivery of a controlled substance, two counts each, two to four years, suspended for three years, probation for three years, costs.

Robert Graham, possession of a controlled substance, two years, work-release recommended; as a condition of work release, study release, or parole, the defendant shall pay \$200 cost of his court-appointed attorney, and court costs.

John Willie McPhatter, second-degree rape, pleaded guilty to attempted second-degree rape, three years, to be in at the expiration of the following sentence pronounced in the breaking or

entering, and larceny charge; breaking or entering, and larceny, three years, credited with 122 days spent in confinement awaiting trial, work-release is recommended in the sentences for attempted rape and for breaking or entering, and larceny; in the attempted-rape sentence, the court orders the defendant be committed initially to Central Prison in Raleigh for medical and psychiatric treatment subject to subsequent transfers to other institutions by the Secretary of Corrections.

Charles Ronald Locklear, assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill, inflicting serious injury, pleaded guilty to misdemeanor assault inflicting serious injury, two years; as restitution or reparation as a condition of attaining work-release privilege or parole, the court orders the defendant make \$8,000 restitution to Debra Caulder

and that he not contact Debra Caulder or any member of her family for an indefinite period.

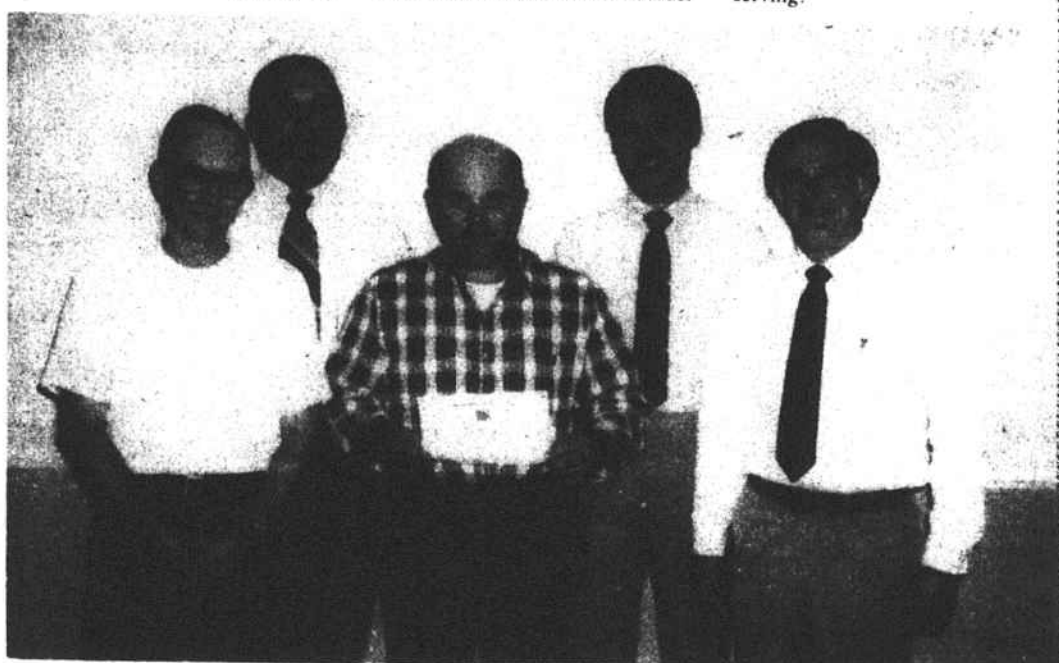
Vincent Lee Jessup, escape, one year, to start at the termination of the sentence the defendant is serving or is obligated to serve.

David Scott Hadnott, escape, one year, to start at the termination of the term the defendant is serving.

Mitchell Jackson, escape, one year, to start at the termination of the sentence the defendant is serving.

James Robert Underwood, escape, one year, the sentence to start at the end of the sentence the defendant is serving.

Raymond Ben Pait, escape, one year, to begin at the expiration of the sentence the defendant is serving.
