Mailmen Back To Foot Work

Raeford mailmen are walking again, at least part of the time, in making their rounds, just as in the old days.

The reason is one of the two vehicles the Raeford Post Office had been using was withdrawn starting last Thursday, part of the Postal Service's nationwide program of energy conservation.

Postmaster Joe Carver said the mailman who walks makes his deliveries in the area close to the Post Office. The motorized carrier covers the rest of the city.

The same carrier doesn't do all the walking, he added; the routes are rearranged, so they take turns.

The de-motorization started nationally two to 2½ years ago in a phased program.

Carver added that the de-motorization doesn't involve the rural delivery service.
