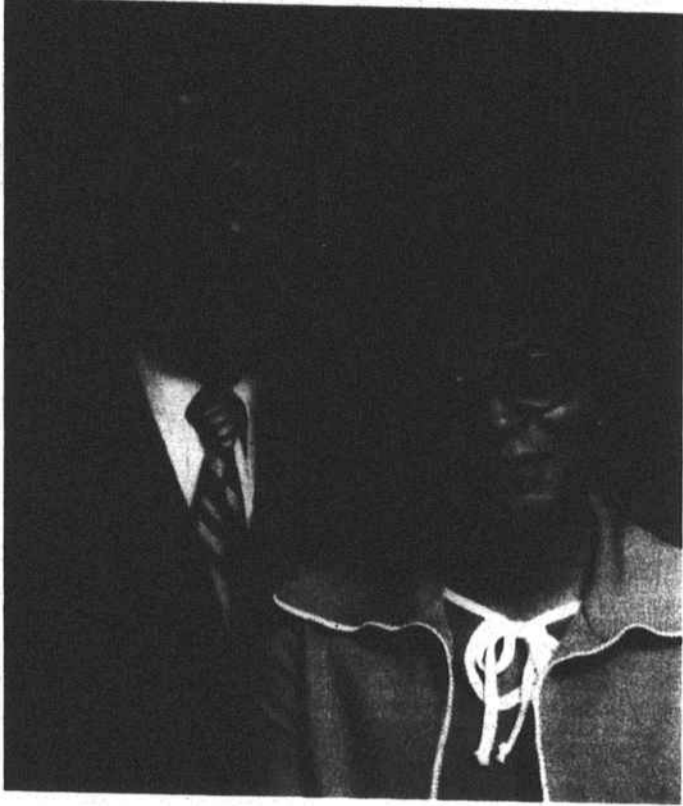

Add charm to an outfit with a perfectly tied bow



At the left - notice the "perfect bow" being used in four different ways. A long narrow purchased scarf can also be tied in similar ways. - Another new look for today is to use a 1/4" to 1/2" wide grosgrain or velvet ribbon under the collar of a buttoned-to-the-neckline blouse or dress - and tied into a small bow with the ends hanging down several inches.

Practice with a waistline sash or a necktie - for the steps of bowtying. Stand at a mirror and study the illustrations below. In no time you'll master the art of the perfect bow. Do share it with your family and friends. Tell them to do the same...and this will pretty up the world a bit for everybody...since a well-tied bow is lovely to look at!

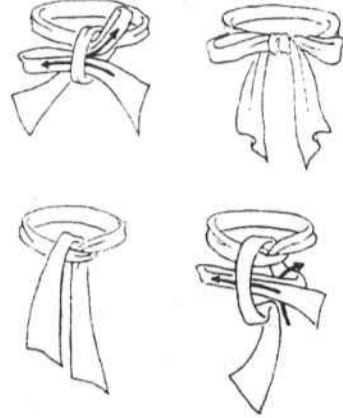
1. With the 2 ends even - make a single knot. Then use the underneath portion to make a loop.

2. Next, bring the upper portion

over and under the first loop to form the knot and a second loop at the same!

3. Finally pull both loops tight, so that they are even in size...and with ends even, too.

4. Puff out the bow and the ends. Smile!
