Carter is a native of Hoke County and moved back from Columbus County to manage The Bank of

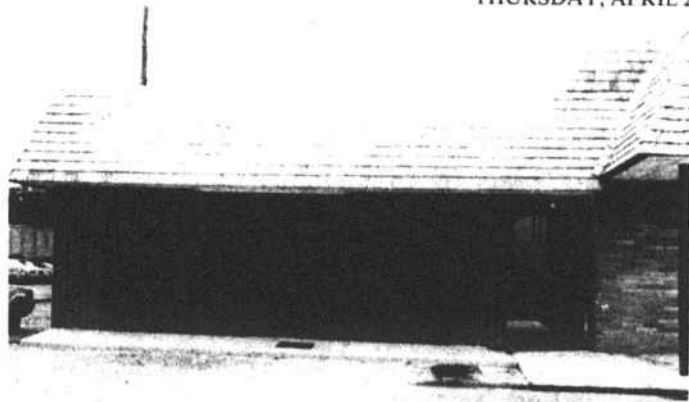
Raeford upon the retirement in 1973 of R.B. Lewis.

Hasty Announces For State House

John C. (Pete) Hasty, a Maxton insurance and real estate executive, has announced he will seek the Democratic nomination to one of the three seats in the State House of Representatives in the district composed of Burleson, Hoke and Scotland counties.

He told *The News-Journal* Friday that his main thrust in the General Assembly would be on the principle that North Carolina needs to continue its economic development. "We need to add jobs for people" in this area -- Hoke, Scotland and Robeson, he added.

Hasty said his experience in industrial development equips him for helping locate industry in the three-county area.

He was born in Maxton March 9, 1930, to William Howard Hasty of Scotland County and Flora Belle Currie of Hoke County. He was married to the former Betty Upchurch of Raeford in 1955. They have three children: John, Jr., 23, of Burlington; Flora Anne, 22, a senior at Wesleyan College in Macon, Ga.; and Elizabeth, 17, a senior at Flora Macdonald Academy in Red Springs.

He is following the family tradition of political involvement as his father, William Howard Hasty, served as mayor of Maxton for a number of years as did his only brother, Howard. C.A. Hasty, his uncle, was a long term county commissioner and a North Carolina state senator.

Hasty is a graduate of Maxton High School, Presbyterian Junior College, and University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He served two years in the Army obtaining the rank of Sergeant in the 101st Airborne Division while stationed at Fort Jackson, S.C.

After he was discharged from the Army in 1953, he entered the insurance business in Raleigh as a Fire Insurance Specialist for United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company. In 1958 he returned to Maxton and became manager of Hasty Insurance Agency, and expanded that business into the field of real estate in 1973.

Hasty is a member of St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Maxton and has served as chairman of the Administrative Board, and of the Building Committee, and served on the Finance Committee. He was one of the founders of the Maxton Jaycees and served as its first president. He is a past president and active member of the Mormax Club in Maxton. Hasty also received the Jaycees' Distinguished Service Award.

An active scouter, he has served on the Executive Committee of the Cape Fear Council of Boy Scouts of America for 12 years and was president of the Council for two years. He received a Silver Beaver award in 1976 for service to the Boy Scouts.

He has also served a number of years on the Laurinburg-Maxton Airport Commission, and is currently the Chairman of the Board. He serves on the Laurinburg Board of Southern National Bank and is an executive member of the Scotland Memorial Hospital trustees.

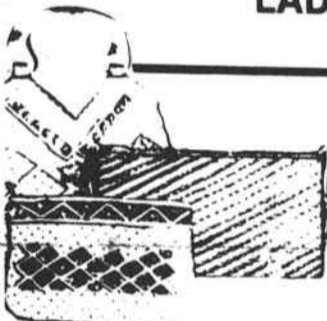
