# Jewelry, Guns, Tools Stolen

The Hoke County Sheriff's Department received the following reports recently.

Larry McNeill, 29, of Wagram, was cut on the left side of his face and on his back Friday on Turnpike Road. The attacker, who was identified, ordered McNeill out of the car in which he was riding with another man and two women. The attacker said he had a gun and would shoot McNeill if McNeill didn't obey.

James W. Powell, Rt. 2, Raeford, reported \$400 worth of aluminum cans and 12 car batteries worth \$48 he had collected were


stolen from his property Thursday or Friday.

## Farm Focus

### LIVESTOCK MANAGEMENT

#### Water

It's amazing how important something so often taken for granted is to all of us. The past two summers have made most Hoke County farmers and their families aware of its importance, if by some chance they didn't realize it before. Also, there are probably several families in the county who had or have had wells go dry on them. Dry weather like we have had brings the importance of water to us and our crops close to home. Yet, do we ever consider the importance of water to our livestock. All too often they go forgotten when water shortages crop up. The cattle, swine, and horses produced in the county require water to survive, also.

Estimated daily requirements vary by weight for each species. It is recommended that beef cattle have an abundant supply of water before them at all times. A mature animal will consume an average of about 12 gallons of water per day. Younger animals would require proportionately less, while lactating cows would require more.

Swine should be provided plenty of clean, fresh water. Under ideal conditions the source should be arranged so that they could not stand or wallow in it. Preferably, that source would be an automatic waterer with water available at all times. If handwatering is practiced, they should be watered two or more times per day, depending on the weather and feed type. For example, if slop or dairy by-products are fed, pigs need proportionately less water than if dry feed is used. An insufficient supply of good fresh water will cause feed consumption to be low. That in turn causes growth and performance to be

slower than expected.

A non-working, mature horse will consume about 12 gallons of water daily, on the average. If the animal is worked, water consumption will increase. Also, weather and the type of feed will affect water consumption. With horses there are many different opinions on the proper time and method to water a horse. A general guideline to use is to water regularly and frequently. Regularity in watering aids in making sure that good, fresh water is available to the animal at all times. Watering frequently implies that water should be provided in small enough quantities to meet the animals needs but not allow it to gorge itself. That is especially important during warm weather or when the animal has been worked hard.

General guidelines for the three types of livestock discussed here are:

- (1) 12 gallons per day for a mature cow
- (2) 1/2 to 1 1/2 gallons per day per 100 lbs. of body weight for a hog
- (3) 12 gallons per day for a mature horse.

These figures are only averages. Actual consumption depends on the animal and the conditions under which it lives. If anything, these figures should be used for estimating the minimum amount of water needed.

Also, we should all be sure to keep adequate, fresh water available for our pets. With the coming of warmer temperatures they will be drinking more water for body cooling. Too many times pets are lost because they drink gasoline or some other toxic substance while looking for a liquid to aid them in cooling their body. So let's all keep gasoline and other poisonous materials in their proper containers and provide adequate water for our pets.

#### Ticks

The arrival of warm weather has signalled the start of tick season. As the weather continues to warm up ticks will become more active. Also, we will start to come into contact with their habitat more often because of our increased outdoor activities. Yet another source of contact is through our pets.

The best way to avoid ticks is to stay on wide paths or roads when in the woods. If you have to go into an area likely to be infested, examine your clothing and body at least twice daily. That reduces the chance of ticks becoming attached to you.

Perhaps just as important, we should frequently check our pets for ticks. Not only can they carry ticks on themselves, they can also bring them into the home or other pet quarters. That can lead to an infestation of you and your family. Commercial materials are available to protect your pet and pet quarters.

Also, most insect repellents are somewhat effective against ticks, so you can protect yourself. Shrubs and bushes in the yard can be sprayed with certain pesticides to control tick populations there as well. While enjoying the warm weather, let's keep a watchful eye out for ticks because tick season is upon us.
