Public Affairs Dept. Has Oct. Meet With Mrs. Matherly

NFWC, Public Affairs Department of the Raeford Womens Club met on Tuesday evening, October 5, at the home of Mrs. Eugene Matherly, with Miss Ellen Currie and Mrs. Jimmy Plummer, Sr., co-hostesses.

Miss Caroline Parker, chairman, presided. During the business session members voted to help the other members of the departments of the Raeford Womens Club to work on getting people to the polls to vote on November 2, Election Day. Plans were also made for a White Elephant Sale at their December meeting.

Mr. Lloyd Horne, director of Hoke County Health Department, presented the program during which he presented Health Care Statistics for Hoke County. He stated that in 1960 we spent 27 billion dollars nationally for health care. In 1978, 182 billion dollars were spent, an increase of 700 percent. In spite of these figures he feels that the people of the nation are no healthier. He also reported that in spite of the Cancer Research that is done the death rate is up, and in spite of Health Research the heart deaths are up. As a citizen he contemplated as to whether we are getting our money's worth. Five nations have lower death cancer rates, 10 nations have lower health rates and 17 nations have higher life expectancy, said Mr. Horne.

He said that Public Health is prevention. One of the biggest killers in Hoke County and elsewhere is accidents. Good, healthy living can add 10 or 11 years to our lives.

Mr. Horne said that the biggest four problems in our community is adolescent pregnancy, hypertension, communicable diseases, and the tuberculosis rate; also in Hoke County we have the second highest rate of gonorrhea in the state and increasing each year and that we are tied for highest in the state for alcoholism. Repeatedly he said prevention is the key to healthy living, that there is no cost involved and no side effects.

At the conclusion of the meeting the hostesses served refreshments.
