Winstead Wins Medal

Bill Winstead of Raleigh, son of the Rev. and Mrs. Arthur Winstead of Raeford, won the Iron Man's Medal in the Sixth Iron Man

Tri-Ath-Lon World Championship this month in West Hawaii.

He was among 850 athletes from throughout the world who competed.

Winstead completed the events in 13 hours, five hours better than the maximum time allowed. The events are: a 2.6-mile swim in the ocean, a 112-mile ride on a bicycle, and a 26.4-mile run. The Tri-Ath-Lon started from the island of Kaula.

During the competition the participants were faced by 35-miles-per-hour winds, gale force, and high temperatures. Some dropped out because of the heat.

Winstead has been an athlete since childhood.

He runs in marathons in the Eastern U.S. and competed in a World's Fair on Okinawa as a representative of the United States.

Winstead water skis also. In college he played basketball, and in high school he was named the Best All Around Student in sports.

He works as Eastern North Carolina representative for McGraw Hospital Supplies, and lives in Raleigh.

The Tri-Ath-Lon will be televised in January on the ABC Wide World of Sports (Channels 5 and 8).

Winstead's father is pastor of Raeford United Methodist Church.
