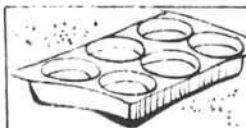
## Friendship Club Meets Nov. 2

This is one of the first projects that the Raeform Jaycees have run since their reorganizing this year.

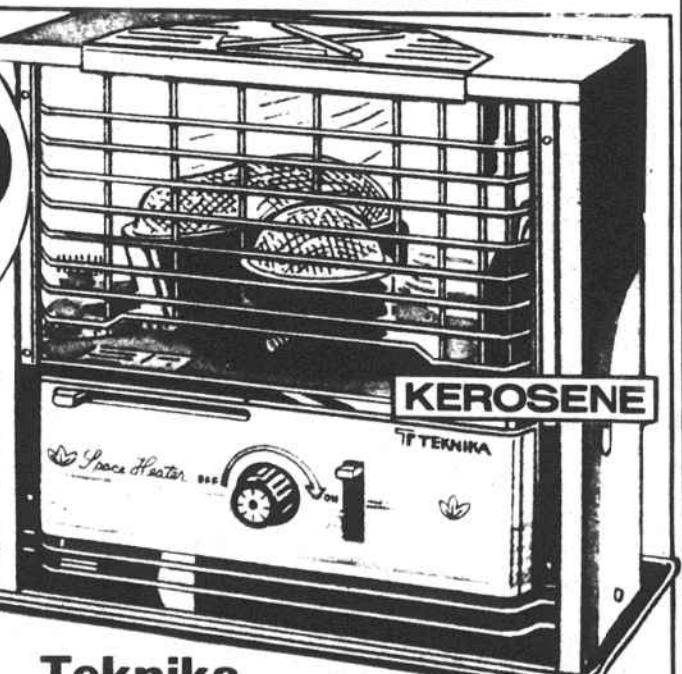
