Dear Doctor: What is a good way to get your dog to take pills? Mine picks the pills out of her food and I have trouble dropping them down

Answer: Dogs love cheese, most any kind of cheese, so try inserting pill into a small chunk of cheddar; a half inch square will do. Or spread the pill with peanut butter or stick it in a hors d'oeuvres-sized section of hotdog. Key to success is giving your .pet three or four pieces of the cheese or hotdog without medication to condition her to think of the food as a treat. She will wolf subsequent

of the air conditioner.

Answer: Pets, like humans, require less calories during very warm weather so, yes, a drop off in appetite is normal in the summer. Your cat may favor the air conditioner as a perch because of the hum and vibrations -- cats frequently climb on top of the refrigerator for the same soothing reason. Such behavior is not harmful. However, if there is cool air coming out of a vent directly on the cat, she could develop a runny nose; and if this is the case, her sitting on the air conditioner should be discouraged.

Dear Doctor: Some friends want to give us their 4-year old shepherd when they are transferred to Europe this fall. I am concerned that it won't adapt to our family.

Answer: Chances are you will have no problems. However, a trial run is recommended. Before the family leaves, have them bring the dog along with some of his bedding or, a favorite rug, toys or an article with the owner's scent to your house for a weeks stay. 
