"We're looking into creating a center turn lane.' state District Eight Highway Commissioner Martha Hollers said Friday

State Rep. Daniel H. DeVane called Hollers earlier in the week and alerted her to the problem.

'I've talked to Danny and have called some people at the state office," Hollers said, adding that officials are looking into finding the funds for the project and might attempt to get the shopping center to pay part of the cost.

He called Hollers after city officials received a negative re-sponse to a request for state assistance with the matter. DeVane said.

Officials fear that the increased traffic at the intersection might cause a serious accident.

State engineers were reluctant to give the city an OK on lowering the speed limit around the shopping center from 55 to 45 miles per hour, Raeford Manager Ronald Matthews said during a November 8 council meeting.

State engineers were also discouraging about the possibility of installing a caution light or constructing a right turn lane, Mat-thews said.

The situation is dangerous, and omething should be done about it, Hollers said.

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
