
The Lady Eagles hosted Edgewood Thursday, Dec. 16 to a 60-11 decision.

Hoke Boys Split, Girls Lose

The South View girls ended the Hoke High girls' winning streak but the Hoke boys started a new one at the expense of the South View boys Friday night at South

The Hoke Junior Varsity also won, 70-67.

The Hoke girls lost a 47-46 decision to South View after winning their first five games. One of their victories was over South View in the second Hoke game of the

The Hoke boys bounced back from their December 14 loss to Cape Fear by winning, 50-44. The win gave the Hoke boys a 4-2 record for the season.

They were the last games of 1982 for the Hoke squads. The lady and gentlemen Bucks will resume play January 4 at home against 71st. Both teams defeated 71st's squads in their first meetings, which came on December 7.

The Hoke boys came from behind at 40-35 count at the end of the third period. Then in the closing minutes of the game, the Bucks, at Coach Ron Parson's direction, staged a full-court press successfully, and Freddie McLean, a 5-foot-5 guard, sank a field goal to put Hoke ahead, 43-42, for the rest of the contest.

Hoke's usual high scorer, Greg Hollingsworth, was held to 15 points by the South View defense, which also held the Bucks to four points in the second quarter, Southview was in front, 25-19, at the half.

The Bucks, however, turned the tables on South View in the fourth period, allowing its shooters only four points.

In the girls' game, South View used a press which, among other things, held Hoke's consistently high-scoring Sabrina Barnes to four points in the second half. Still, she came out of the game the top individual scorer, with 18
