
Answer: Cats do get lonely so be sure she has plenty of toys to play with and you may want to consider getting a second cat as a compa-

Answer: This sounds like a natural habit particular to your poodle. However, you may want to have a veterinarian examine your pet for tonsilitis, pharnygitis or dental problems.

If it is none of these conditions, there is a chance that it could be a dysfunction of one of the sympathetic cranial nerves, and not much can be done to remedy this situation. If you would like to have this checked out, contact a neurologist at the nearest university with a college of veterinary
