The matter will be considered at the February 1 commission meeting. County Manager Martin will work with the fire departments and to develop firmer cost for the improvements prior to the meeting.

Court House Aid Sought

A request will be made to state Rep. Daniel H. DeVane to introduce a special bill in the Legislature for funds to aid in the restoration of the Hoke County Court House.

Because of the building's historical significance, Martin said there is a good chance that state

for the restoration project.

Architectural studies have pegged the cost of the project at \$90,000, but restoration of the 72-year-old building might be trim-med to around \$60,000, Martin

If state funds are approved, they would probably be provided to be matched with local funds on a 50-50 basis, Martin said.

-- Received for information the annual report from the Hoke County Rescue Squad.

Shelter Managers Readied

If a natural disaster were to occur in Hoke County, shelters would be available to house over 40,000 survivors.

In order to be prepared for such a disaster, about 35 managers of those shelters attended a course here January, and were briefed on the latest operational procedures.

The course, which was conducted by representatives from the state Department of Natural Resources and Community Development (NRCD) and under the auspices of the Emergency Management Agency, was held at the Lester Building on Magnolia

Representatives from industries, schools and buildings that house the shelters attended the all-day

Hoke County is a host county and the Emergency Management Agency here is prepared to handle about 40,000 survivors, Director Bill Niven said.

In the case of a natural disaster, school buildings would be used primarily, Niven said.

The majority of Wednesday's session focused on natural disasters, Niven said, noting that a future session will cover shelter management during wartime.

Last week's course was attended by principals or assistant principals from all of the county's schools, members of the Hoke County Sheriff's Department, Raeford Police officers, representatives from the Department of Social Services, Hoke County Government, mental health, public health, McCain Hospital, McCain Prison, Sandhills Youth Center and several local industries.

All of those attending are involved with managing a shelter.
