Coop Membership Group Mulling Future Action

No further action has been taken in the battle between the Lumbee Cooperative Board of Directors and a membership action group that is trying to unseat them, a spokesman for the action group said Monday.

Membership Action Group leader Carl Branch said the group was to have held a press conference for Tuesday night and at the meeting hoped to reveal what they are planning to do about the coop board, Branch said.

At this point nothing is definite. he said.

Both the group and the board have been quiet since the directors denied the group's bid for a recall meeting scheduled for last Thursday

A petition asking for the recall meeting was presented to the board several weeks ago with over 2,000 members' signatures on it.

A battle between the groups, which has been going on for over two months now, reached an aprejected the peninion recall bid last month, moting that there was not a justificable reason for the coop to foot the cost of a recall election. A recall election would cost ap-proximately \$20,000, the coop

parent stalemate when the board

directors have said.

The disagreement between the dissident members and the board, apparentily stems from the action group's contention that directors are drawing large salaries and paying themselves too much for attending meetings.

The vote to reject the petition came in a closed door session and apparently despite advice from the boand's antorney to allow the recall meetime

Since the rejection, the action group has been meeting regularly with their lawyer in efforts to come up with "a new plan"

Some directors have said the board is waiting for the membership group to make its next move before taking any action of their
