## NAACP Holds Banquet

The Hoke County Branch NAACP held its annual banquet Saturday March 5 at the Gibson cafeteria on Hoke County High Campus.

The well attended affair guest speaker was attorney H.M. "Mickey" Michaux of Durham a former candidate for Congress from the second District. The theme of the banquet health, education, welfare, housing and political involvement was spoken to by Michaux.

Michaux especially emphasized the Black man's need for more political involvement and setting the right priorities for things that are rightfully his. He stated that the Black church, colleges, fraternities and sororities have a continued obligation to the Black community especially in the 80's.

Michaux ended his speech with the benediction from the Black Broadway play "Purlie."

The welcome was given by G. Raz Astry Superintendent of the Hoke County Schools, Representative Danny H. DeVane, County Commissioner, Cleo Bratcher. Musical selections were given by the Piney Grove Baptist Church choir under the direction of Russell McAllister and accompanist

Teresa Pickett. The purpose of the NAACP was given by Ms. Norma J. Campbell:

- To eliminate racial discrimination and segregation from all aspects of public life in America.
- To secure a free ballot for every qualified American citizen.
- To seek justice in the courts.
- To secure legislation banning discrimination and segregation.
- To secure equal job opportunities based upon individual merit without regard to race, religion or national origin.
- To end mob violence and police brutality.

Closing remarks were given by representative Sidney Locks.

## Coop Membership Group Mulling Future Action

No further action has been taken in the battle between the Lumbee Cooperative Board of Directors and a membership action group that is trying to unseat them, a spokesman for the action group said Monday.

Membership Action Group leader Carl Branch said the group was to have held a press conference for Tuesday night and at the meeting hoped to reveal what they are planning to do about the coop board, Branch said.

At this point nothing is definite, he said.

Both the group and the board have been quiet since the directors denied the group's bid for a recall meeting scheduled for last Thursday.

A petition asking for the recall meeting was presented to the board several weeks ago with over 2,000 members' signatures on it.

A battle between the groups, which has been going on for over two months now, reached an ap-

parent stalemate when the board rejected the petition recall bid last month, noting that there was not a justifiable reason for the coop to foot the cost of a recall election.

A recall election would cost approximately \$20,000, the coop directors have said.

The disagreement between the dissident members and the board, apparently stems from the action group's contention that directors are drawing large salaries and paying themselves too much for attending meetings.

The vote to reject the petition came in a closed door session and apparently despite advice from the board's attorney to allow the recall meeting.

Since the rejection, the action group has been meeting regularly with their lawyer in efforts to come up with "a new plan."

Some directors have said the board is waiting for the membership group to make its next move before taking any action of their own.
