Sunday School Lesson

Background Scripture: Acts 19 through 20.
Devotional Reading: John 17: 20-26.

Last year when I visited the ruins of Ephesus, I made a point of leaving the guided tour of which I was a part, so that I could take some time to cross the road and wander around the ruins of what had once been the Temple of Diana, one of the seven wonders of the ancient world. From the accounts that have come down to us, it was once a massive structure with a gigantic statue of the goddess Diana. Today, however, there is hardly anything left of it but a single, solitary column that stands like a sentinel over a grave.

As I stood and viewed this pitiful remnant of the past, I couldn't help but remember what the crowd had roared when Paul visited this city: "Great is Artemis of the Ephesians" (*Artemis* another name for *Diana*). Apparently Artemis had not been so "great" as the Ephesians had proclaimed. By comparison, the Gospel Paul preached in Ephesus now spans the globe.

Why was it that these two faiths clashed? Was it inevitable? Could they not have found some way of co-existing? One answer is surely that Christianity and the cult of *Diana* were bound to clash because the Good News of Jesus Christ couldn't help but be a threat to the cult of *Diana*, including those who stood to profit most from the cult's continuance and growth.

Although it was on the grounds of wrong teaching that Demetrius and his silversmiths opposed Paul and his preaching, it is easily ap-

parent that it was money, not conscience that was speaking. The men he assembled to oppose Paul were highly motivated by their vested interests in the cult of *Diana*: "Men, you know that from this business we have our wealth. And you see and hear that only at Ephesus but almost throughout all Asia this Paul has persuaded and turned away a considerable company of people, saying that gods made with hands are not gods." The bottom line was that Paul was bad for business. Later, Demetrius would also worry about Artemis' loss of adherents, but it was obvious that his profits were speaking loudest of all.

Paul's experience with the silversmiths in Ephesus was not the last time that the Gospel was found to be "bad for business." For, whenever business or profit are dependent upon the exploitation of other people, whenever it is founded upon values that are contrary to the Good News of Jesus Christ, the collision is inevitable.

There is a kind of postscript to this incident. Just when it seems the whole city is about to riot, the town clerk confronts them and manages to quell the disturbance before it gets out of hand. Nothing has happened to justify such an uproar, he tells them. If Demetrius and his associates have a worthwhile complaint, "the courts are open." Violence and passion will not settle this dispute for either side.

Too bad we don't know this town clerk's name, for he is worthy of being remembered. Even more, he is worthy of being emulated whenever money speaks louder than our God-given consciences.

Full Season Scheduled At Brevard Music Center

Six musical stage productions, a long list of guest artists, plus over 50 different concert events highlight the upcoming summer season at Brevard Music Center.

In announcing the scheduled attractions for North Carolina's famed summer music performance center, Artistic Director Henry Janiec commented, "This is our 48th season, and we look forward to the variety and quality that have firmly established Brevard's reputation as a major national music festival."

Brevard's season opener, called "A Salute to the Met", is set for July 1. The concert honors the Metropolitan Opera Company in its 100th anniversary year as a world leader and trend setter.

Met star and BMC alumna Gianna Rolandi, stars in "Daughter of the Regiment" on July 2, opening the opera season at Brevard.

Other music productions include Gilbert and Sullivan's "Iolanthe", the grand opera "La Traviata", "Carousel", "Tales of Hoffman", and a revival of Sigmund Romberg's "The New Moon". Thursday night dress rehearsals of stage productions are open to the public at reduced ticket prices.

Returning for his 19th year as head of the BMC Opera Workshop is veteran director John Richards McCrae.

Guest artists of international reputation are set to appear throughout the July 1 - August 14 season. Weekend festival concerts will host performers such as pianist Jorge Bolet, soprano Victoria de los Angeles, and cellist Olga Rostropovich.

Carlos Montoya, generally regarded as the foremost Spanish flamenco guitarist of the day, and legendary Metropolitan Opera star Robert Merrill will also appear.

The list of guest artists include pianist Douglas Weeks, violinist Ralph Evans, trombonist Charles

Vernon, and the Brevard Festival Trio.

For the first time in its history, Brevard will present a complete ballet performance when The Augusta Ballet Company performs "Coppelia", Sunday, July 23.

A series of three pops concerts begins on July 9 with "Barbershop Night", followed by "A Broadway Gala" on July 22, and "Lerner and Loewe Night" on August 6.

"A Choral Evening", on July 21, showcases BMC choruses, soloists, and full orchestra in a performance of Poulenc's "Gloria", conducted by Mary Nell Saunders. The other major choral program is the season's finale, on August 14, in which a 150-voice chorus will perform Orff's "Carmina Burana".

Brevard's weekend performances include chamber music recitals, orchestra, band, and wind ensemble concerts, along with a lecture series by composer-in-residence Martin Mailman. Friday and Saturday curtain times are 8:15 p.m.

Sunday concerts are at 3:00 p.m.

Daily performances are scheduled during BMC's 6 1/2 week season, with times varying from 4:00 p.m. to 8:15 p.m.

Performance schedules and tickets to individual performances are now available through the main office at Brevard, with box office opening on June 7.
