(Continued from page 1A) was not cooperative during the breathalizer test.

"He would not blow into the mouth piece and kept threatening me and my wife," Minshew said. "I told him to either give me a sample or sign a written refusal,"

Minshew added.

According to Minshew's testimony, Purcell "jumped" the trooper while in the breathalizer "He jumped at me and put his

hands around my throat, then he knocked me backwards," Minshew said.

During the scuffle, Bowden apparently re-entered the scene.

"I heard a disturbance in the breathalizer room and went back to check it out," Bowden testified. "I saw Sergeant Minshew reeling backwards from the breathalizer room," Bowden add-

"Trooper Bowden came running back, grabbed Purcell and they both fell to the floor," Minshew

During the struggle, Bowden

"Bowden was just lying on the floor limp," Minshew said.

Bowden told the court that he

had injured his back and could not stand up. Hoke County Sheriff Dave Barr-

ington testified that he "heard" the noises and went to check on the disturbance.

According to testimony, Purcell again tried to assault the officers, but was finally detained and jailed by the sheriff and a deputy

All three prosecuting witnesses testified that they felt Purcell had been drinking.

"In my opinion he had consum-ed enough intoxicant to alter his mental and physical condition,'

Sheriff Barrington said. After the judgement was issued, Purcell's attorney, Philip Diehl, requested that the defendant be granted "work release" privileges.

"I will grant him work release if he agrees to give half of his earnings for the use and benefit of Trooper Bowden and the other half to his family," Judge Dupree

Since the incident, Bowden has remained off duty and has had to undergo spinal surgery. His future with the highway patrol is uncer-


