**Sept. 17 BOBTAIL RACE** -- North Carolina Motor Speedway in Rockingham will be the site of a Great American Truck Racing bobtail truck race Saturday, Sept. 17. The 250-mile race around Rockingham's 1.017-mile high-banked oval will be known as the Carolina Bobtail 250 and will post a \$56,250 purse, plus manufacturers' awards. The event will mark the fifth time that the 14,000-pound, 10-wheel trucks have competed at North Carolina Motor Speedway. Among the drivers expected to compete are Charlie Baker, New Oxford, Pa.; Bill Johnson, Trinity, N.C.; Mike Adams, Seneca, S.C.; Doyle Montgomery, Cincinnati, Ohio; Luther Burton, Columbus, Ind.; Junior Reed, Franklin, Tenn.; E.J. Utley, Orlando, Fla.; and Jimmy Padgett, Houston, Texas. Over 35 trucks are expected to be on hand Friday, Sept. 16, for practice and qualification, vying for the 26 starting positions in the Saturday Carolina Bobtail 250. The 36th was first organized as a regular army unit 7 August 1918, at Ft. McClellan, Alabama, and after a short life was demobilized following the end of WWI on 8 February 1919. The 36th was reactivated 10 October 1939 at Fort Bragg and outfitted with the old 155 mm. GPF guns left over from WWI. At last outfitted with brand new 155 mm. "Long Tom" guns, the 36th shipped out of Fort Bragg on a bright and hot August day to blaze its way through North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France, and Germany, with its 1,500 men and officers. Campaign credits were given the unit for Tunisia, Sicily, Naples-Foggia, Anzio, Rome-Arno, Southern France, North Apennines, Rhineland, Ardennes-Alsace, Central Europe, and Po Valley. France awarded the 36th with the Croix de Guerre with Palm.
