Miss Clark, Mr. Requard Pledge Wedding Vows Here Saturday

Dr. John C. Ropp officiated at the double ring ceremony.

A program of wedding music was presented by organist, Ashley Burrell and vocalist, Ken Koonce. Mr. Koonce sang "The Wedding Prayer" and "The Lord's Prayer." The wedding was directed by Mrs. Reid Childress, aunt of the bride.

The church was decorated with a basket of white flowers on the Communion table. Caldelabra and greenery were used on the altar. Eight candles with hurricane lanterns and greenery were used along the sides of the church. During the ceremony, a unity candle was also lit on the Communion table.

The bride, escorted by her brother-in-law, Jim McPhaul, wore a formal candlelight gown of original design created of sheer ivory organza and Venice lace, posed over faille taffeta.
