In a move to make the equipment the city already has last longer, the City Council approved a motion to re-roof an equipment storage shed.

"Right now, the equipment had just as well be sitting out in the weather," Phillips said.

Bids for the roofing job have already been taken, and the lowest was \$9,700 and was offered by a local company, Lupo Construction.

The council had put \$8,000 into the budget for half of the roof, but approved the higher bid for the entire job with the extra funding to come out of the fund balance.

"This is about the last year we can save the whole roof," Phillips said.

Phones purchased

In a move that will save money for the city in the long run, the council approved the purchase of the currently leased phone system in City Hall.

The system will cost the city \$4,099 plus 4.5% sales tax, according to Phillips.

After the system is paid for, there will be a saving of \$330 per month, Phillips said.
