Bus wreck injures 12

A bus driver and 11 students were injured Monday in an accident between two Hoke County school huses, a spokesman for the Board of Education said

Bus number 18 was picking up students on State Road 1302 approximately one-quarter mile north of the airport when bus number 47 bumped into the right rear of the stopped vehicle, according to Hoke County Schools Business Administrator Don Steed

Both vehicles were headed south when the incident occurred at approximately 7:30 a.m.

Steed said the driver of bus number 47, Paul Kelton, 17, Box 250, Raeford, and he saw the stopped bus, applied the brakes, but was unable to stop before running into the other vehicle.

The driver of bus number 18, Mary McCullum, 30, 1932 Tyler Loop Road, Raeford, was treated for neck injuries at Dr. Robert

Towmend's office and released that day.

Sixty seven students were riding on bus number 47, and 25 students were on bus 18 at the time of the a cudent.

Seven students on bus number 47 and four students on but number 18 were injured.

"It's very fortunate that the children weren't hurt any more than they were," Steed aid.

Dr. R. M. Jordan, who treated 10 of the students involved in the accident, said none of his patients were seriously injured.

"It was just a matter of bumps and bruises for the most part," Jordan said.

Jordan said he advised three of the injured students to go home for the day

Court records say Locklear was arrested on July 26, 1985 at his residence after law enforcement officers obtained a search warrant. Officers found 26 bags of cocame and a quantity of maniuana at Locklear's residence, records

atv. The search warrant was obtained after Locklear allegedly sold cocaine to a state undercover Alcohol Law Enforcement agent.

In an unrelated cale, Chris Edward Brahin, Rt. I, Box 627, Lexington, was sentenced to a fouryear prison term as a committed youthful offender after he pleaded suilty to a charge of assault with a deadly weapon with the intent to Icall.

Reports say Brahin, 19. assaulted John Bradley Moore by

shooting him three times with a .12 gaure shotgun on January 18 Moore required medical treat-

ment which included surgery and hospitalization.

Also, Mary Bullard, Rt. I, Red. Spring, was sentenced to a threeyear prison term after she pleaded no contest to two counts of selling marijuana.

Bullard, 42, sold marijuana to an agent with the N.C. Alcohol Law Enforcement Agency on

February 10, according to records. Bullard also had a suspended sentence revoked for violating the terms of probation and was sentenced to an additional twoyear prison term.

According to records, Bullard had previously been sentenced to two years, suspended for three years, in Superior Court after she pleaded guilty to charges of possesion with intent to sell a controlled substance and possession of drug

paraphernalia.

In another case, Jerry McNeill, P.O. Box 721, Raeford, was sentenced to a six year prison term. after he pleaded guilty to charges of breaking and entering and larceny

Sewer help request tabled by commission

A request for a portion of Hoke County's state water funds to help pay the cost of replacing blowers at the Raeford wastewater treatment plant was tabled Monday by members of the county commis-SIGD.

A committee was established to study the request.

The request, made by Raciord City Manager Foil Philips, was for a portion of the county's Senate Bill Twey grain money.

The grant money is available to both municipalities and coordines for funding 50% of non-federal public saler and sewage projects. The total cost to replace treatment plant's existing an blowers. with four new more powerful

blowers in \$160.0820. Fire city manager said half the maney for the project would come out of the city's water fund.

Phillips asked the commissioners for \$40,000 of the county's grant money and said the other

\$40,000 would come from the any' Senate Bill Iwo funds.
