ment efforts. The departments received vehicles as part of a federal program to make surplus military equipment available to state and local law enforcement agencies for use in drug interdiction efforts. The police department received two and the sheriffs' department one

Local law enforcement agencies may request a variety of items ranging from boats, generators and radio equipment, to field gear and motor homes that can be converted to command centers. Agencies must complete an application explaining how the items will be used to fight drug activities in their area. Equip-

ment obtained under this program is transferred to the state and local law enforcement agencies in an "as is, where is" condition.

The state recently received 177 fourwheel drive vehicles that were then distributed to 52 police departments and 29 sheriff's departments, as well as several state law enforcement agencies.

The Department of Crime Control and Public Safety was designated by Governor Hunt as the sponsoring state agency for North Carolina. North Carolina is one of the 11 southeastern states taking part in the program operated by the U.S. Department of Defense and the U.S. Department of Justice.
