Roosevelt McPherson, an eighth grade teacher at the middle school, said one day a student in his classroom threatened another student, saying he was going to have his "gang" take care of him after school.

Although he had heard rumors about gangs in the community and in the school, he said this threat made him realize the school had a real problem. The faculty started formally investigating and found some students were, in fact, involved with gangs. School officials realized the school needed to act quickly to deter gangrelated violence at school.
