One-stop voting turnout a sign of voter awareness

Not waiting for election day November 2, Raeford voters are steadily pouring into the county office building to cast their absentee one-stop ballots.


Across the state, almost 5.5 million Tar Heel voters are registered, which is up by at least 100,000 voter registrations since the primary. In Hoke, 20,547 voters — the most ever — were registered as of yesterday with more than 1,400 new registrations counted since the primary.

"Smooth, smooth," is how the advance election process is flowing, according to Caroline Shook, Hoke Board of Elections director.

"The voters are coming from all over," Shook said. "However, we have seen the heaviest turnout from Raeford precincts 1 through 5.

"Most voters coming in are saying they want to vote early to make sure they voted They say they do not want to miss out, and this process is very convenient for them."

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Jail project stalled, awaiting land acquisition

Negotiating to buy 'The Atrium'

The Hoke board of commissioners postponed proceeding with a construction plan for the Hoke detention center expansion after a closed session on Monday night. An alternate plan the board privately discussed would not require demolition of the old jail as planned while the construction phase of the jail facility is going on.

"We have been approached to buy about a one-half acre of land where the historic home now called The Atrium is located on Stewart Street," Daniels said. "The purchase price would be about \$150,000, but it is still under negotiation."

Daniels said the Atrium home is situated next to the parking lot where sheriff's vehicles are parked at the corner of Edinborough and Stewart, and across the street from the Sheriff's Office. It would be ideal to use for expanding the jail, he added.

"It would allow us to build the entire jail expansion without having to demolish the old jail until after the new law enforcement center is constructed," Daniels said.

"We would not have to move the Sheriff's Office while demolition is going on as we originally planned or look for offices to lease temporarily for the sheriff's staff.

"It would also prevent us from having to house inmates out-of county, which was going to cost almost \$1 million if we had to do this demolition first."

Daniels said the board also rejected a plan during closed session to purchase the historic McLauchlin building. If the board had purchased the in-town property between Edinborough and Elwood, it would have provided additional land to increase

the size of the proposed Hoke County Law Enforcement Center, he added.

"The owners of the McLauchlin property wanted more money for the property than the county could afford to pay," Dan-

Daniels said this could be a "golden opportunity" to save time and taxpayers' money if the Atrium property can be secured. The jail plan formerly called for completion within about three years, but the construction time could be cut by one year, he added.

Raeford man charged with downloading child pornography

A Raeford man is charged with visiting child pornography sites and with downloading and disseminating photographs from those sites.

Samuel Lee Coil Jr., 45, of West Sixth Avenue, was charged

on October 15 with 12 second degree sexual exploitation of a minor, 12 counts of third de-

exploitation of a minor, and 51 counts of felony disseminate obscenity. He is in Hoke County Jail under \$150,000 secured bond.

Raeford Police Chief Kevin Locklear said his department received information from an outof-state law enforcement agency that Coil had been downloading and disseminating nude photos of

minors in his home computer. He said a detective in Ohio who investigates child pornography had received email from the suspect. The detective's job is to surf the web and look for sex offenders and child pornography, according to the chief. The officer contacts local officials when suspects are found, the chief says.

Raeford PD was contacted on September 24, 2003. Officers confiscated Coil's computer and contacted the State Bureau of Investigation for their help, Locklear said, and the computer was sent to a SBI lab.

"An abundant amount of child pornography was found on Coil's computer, the chief said.
