Error costs Hoke 19 vaccine points Not even a third of residents are vaccinated, state says

Due to an apparent error in how the state was applying vaccination data, Hoke County doesn't have nearly as many people vaccinated against COVID-19 as previously

reported by state and federal agencies, according to an update from the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS).

Originally the county looked to be among the lowest in the state for vaccinations, based on the data tracked through the state's CO-VID-19 vaccination management system. When state and federal agencies added in the number of people who had gotten their shots through vaccination programs from the United States Department of Defense, Department of

Veterans Affairs, Indian Health Services and the Federal Bureau of Prisons – Hoke's numbers went up, even topping the 50 percent mark for people who had received at least one dose of a COVID-19

However, when data managers

included that information, they apparently only looked at where the shots were administered, not where the people getting those shots actually live, according to an NCDHHS press release sent out Friday, October 1.

The officers checked vitals, performed sternum rubs and
