

Lieut Shipp Exonerated.

Special to the Charlotte Observer. WINSTON, April 6.—The whipping of cadet Rider at the Davis school Wednesday has been thoroughly investigated by the boy's father, Mr M T Rider, of Richmond, Va, who arrived here this morning. Mr Rider, after interviewing his son readily came to the conclusion that his boy had not been "unmercifully" whipped, and fully exonerates Col Davis and Lieut Shipp of the charge. Cadet Rider came to the hotel Phoenix at noon to day and said to the Observer correspondent that he was whipped quite severely but not cruelly.

The following statement from the son's father to Col Davis explains itself: "On account of the reports sent out by the press that my son had been cruelly whipped by Lieut Shipp I came to investigate. I had upon examination that he has not been too severely punished. M T RIDER " Cadet Rider will remain at the Davis school. Today's Charlotte Observer says editorially: The statement of superintendent Davis, published yesterday morning, was an acquittal of the military officer. Lieut Shipp is a gentleman and a man of fine control, as well as a soldier, and it is not to be supposed that in the case in question he overstepped the bounds of legitimate discipline.

Less Cotton and More Food Products. The Manufacturers' Record of Baltimore publishes this week letters from 30 large fertilizer dealers in Florida, Tennessee, Virginia, Mississippi, Alabama, North Carolina, Georgia and South Carolina, which show that less cotton is being planted this year and more attention is being given to food products. Sixteen of the firms estimate that the area of cotton planted this year will be from 5 to 80 per cent less than last year; 18 note an improvement in the general condition of business.

WILMINGTON, Del, April 6.—The police commissioners have framed an ordinance to be submitted to the next city council meeting. It prohibits any girl under seventeen years from attending a public picnic, ball or dance house after 8 p m, or to be on the streets after 10 p m, without the presence of a parent or person over twenty one years of age, standing in the relation of guardian to the girl.

CHICAGO, April 6.—Prendergast, the assassin, has secured another point. His insanity hearing has been postponed until May 21 and the date of execution has been set for July 2.
