

**The Episcopal Convention.**

Winston, May 18.—The third day's session of the Episcopal convention was opened at 9 o'clock. Rev H H Hardy read the litany and conducted the morning prayer. It was enacted that a clergyman coming to this state would be entitled to a seat after 12 months' residence in the diocese. A resolution was passed instructing the diocesan trustees to invest all funds of the convention in good real estate as far as possible. Miss Julia O Emery, of New York, addressed the meeting of the diocesan branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the board of missions. This evening a meeting in the interest of missions was held, at which speeches were made by Mr Chas M Busbee and others. Mr Chas E Johnson was reelected treasurer of the diocese. Bishop Cheshire, Rev Mr George and Messrs Busbee, McBee and Dr Murdock made addresses on the order of St Andrew's brotherhood. This order is comparatively a new one, and appears to be a most important adjunct to the church work. Bishop Capers, of South Carolina, arrived this afternoon. He will preach the memorial sermon Sunday in honor of the late bishop Lyman. The next convention will be held at Morganton, May 15th, 1895. Congressman Henderson was elected historiographer of the diocese. Dr Murdock, of Salisbury, was elected a trustee of the University of the South. The old standing committee, composed of Revs Drs Marshall, Smedes, Sutton, Dr Hines, and R H Battle, Esq, all of Raleigh, were re-elected. Bishop Cheshire was instructed to memorialize the trustees of the General Theological Seminary, of New York, to use the interest of the North Carolina scholarship fund.

**Weather Conditions and Forecast.**

The storm yesterday central near the east lake region has moved southeast to Virginia with rain over all of the Atlantic coast states and in the Ohio valley. The heaviest rains reported were 3.97 inches at Raleigh; 1.60 at Knoxville; 1.24 at Savannah; and 1.01 at Charleston. A very decided "cool wave" has advanced from the northwest into the central valley. The temperature has fallen since yesterday morning over 20 degrees at following places: Knoxville, fall of 26 degrees; Nashville, fall 30 degrees; Atlanta, 24 degrees; Memphis, 20 degrees; Cincinnati, 30 degrees. The probabilities are now for several days of fair quite cool weather.

For North Carolina: Showers tonight near the coast; Fair Sunday; much cooler. Local forecast: Showers tonight followed Sunday by fair weather, much cooler. "Cool wave," Monday fair and cool. Local data for 24 hours ending 8 a m today: Maximum, 93; minimum, 64; rainfall, 3.97.
