

**DROPPED ELEVEN STORIES.**

**A Man Falls 145 Feet and Lives to Describe His Sensations.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., October 14.—Albert Deale, a steam fitter, fell from the eleventh story of the new Schneider flats, in this city, to the basement, and escaped without injury. At the ground floor the small of his back struck a heavy beam, which makes his escape the more marvelous. He turned two or three somersaults as he shot down to the ground. Two or three times his head grazed projecting iron beams. Over and over he went, and as he struck that beam, after a drop of 145 feet, the force of the blow caused him to bound back 2 or 3 feet. Then he fell to the cellar limb and apparently dead. Several workmen on the first floor, who had heard Deale strike the beam, ran into the basement, expecting to find their friend unconscious and mangled, if not actually dead. As they approached Deale, he got up, looked dazed for a moment, then said slowly, as if he could hardly find breath: "I fell off the elevator."

The men lifted him, and he started to walk. But after two or three steps he became deathly sick and sank to the ground unconscious. His friends thought he was dying from the shock, and ran for a doctor and a priest. Dr. Weaver returned with men, and found Deale recovering rapidly, only complaining of a bad pain in his back. A hasty examination showed that no bones were broken. There was a bruise where he had struck the beam, but the skin was not lacerated. The sickness resulted from extreme fright and dizziness, caused by the lightning-like drop through the air.

For hours he had all the symptoms of an aggravated attack of sea sickness and could not swallow even lime water. He complained a little of the pain in his back, but thought lightly of it. Dr. Weaver assured him he had received no internal injuries. Deale told the story of the fall. "I could not help it," he said. "The elevator gave a lurch, and I was thrown off. I knew I was turning over and over, and thought I would strike against the sides of the shaft. I thought I had reached my last moment, and I was rattled. I could not get my thoughts together. I seemed to think I ought to grab hold of something and save myself, and then I would think it was no use, and that it was all up with me. Then I hit the beam, and that's all. I was going down on the elevator to see about some steam heaters."

**A Curious Suit For Insurance.**

A curious action arising from a remarkable accident at a German chemical works is about to puzzle the German courts. Conrad Wuehner entered the works with a lantern. An explosion occurred, followed by the bursting of the acid tanks, and nothing has since been seen of the man, not even a shred of clothing or a morsel of his body. Wuehner was insured, and the widow claims the amount of his policy, but the company declines to pay on the ground that there is no proof of death.

A chemical analysis at the flooded works after the explosion revealed traces of animal matter, such as dissolved bone, but the insurance company declines to accept such a novel proof of death, because, among other things, the analyst cannot swear that the liquefied bone was the bone of a human being. The unhappy widow was saved the expense of a funeral, but in every other respect she is a badly used woman, and public sympathy is taking the form of subscriptions to help her to fight the insurance company.

**Cyclers as Policemen.**

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 12.—With the approval of a committee from the associated cycling clubs, several men were selected today to take up the work of patrolling the streets on bicycles with the special object of arresting violators of the ordinances bearing upon reckless riding. All of the men were selected from members of the regular force familiar with the use of the wheel, and will enter upon the work at once. To avoid attracting unusual attention, they will wear either ordinary citizens' clothes or the uniform of some of the local clubs.

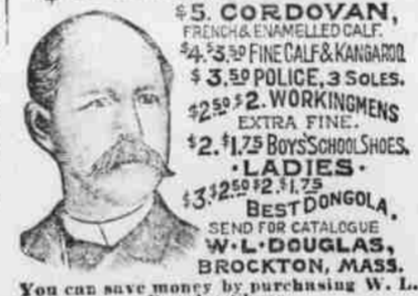
