The demand in Washington for a  
 cheap loaf of bread will surely spread  
 into other cities. The matter now  
 comes up in Richmond.

Dispatches show that in the battle  
 fought yesterday between the Chinese  
 and Japanese 3,500 Chinese troops of  
 all arms were utterly routed.

Telegrams received from Livadia  
 yesterday say the condition of the  
 czar of Russia is slightly improved.  
 The czar and imperial family will go  
 by steamer to Corfu.

Two hundred and fifty members of  
 the Woman's Christian Temperance  
 Union of Indiana have passed resolu-  
 tions to go to the polls in Novem-  
 ber and attempt to vote in order to  
 aid in testing the constitutionality of  
 Indiana's state law.

The French anarchists are prepar-  
 ing for another outbreak. They have  
 resolved that three of their number  
 shall go to Paris for the purpose of  
 causing an explosion in the chamber  
 of deputies. The police watch in the  
 vicinity has been doubled.

It is altogether likely that Miss  
 Ellen Dorch, a pretty young girl,  
 private secretary of Gov. Atkinson of  
 Georgia, will be gazetted as major of  
 the state guard. The last legislature  
 changed the office so as to cover con-  
 trol of the state militia, giving the  
 holder the title of major.

Another case of small-pox develops  
 at Washington D. C. James I. Parker,  
 of Indiana, law clerk in the division  
 of the department of the interior where  
 the other cases were reported, was a  
 victim. Secretary Hoke Smith issued  
 directions to have the interior depart-  
 ment closed today.

Capt. V. E. McBee has been ap-  
 pointed general superintendent of  
 transportation of the Seaboard Air  
 Line system, with headquarters at  
 Atlanta. He was formerly superin-  
 tendent of the Richmond and Dan-  
 ville lines in North and South Carolina.  
 He succeeds Mr. Dickinson, who was  
 appointed only ten days ago.

A fast bicycle rider has beaten the  
 record of the fastest running horse  
 over a mile course. Mounted upon  
 two wheels, John S. Johnson covered  
 that distance at Buffalo Wednesday,  
 in 1:35.25. This beats the world's  
 record of a running horse over a mile  
 course, which is 1:36.1-2, and was  
 made by Salvator at Monmouth park  
 in 1890.

President Weir of the Adams ex-  
 press company now says the net loss  
 by the Quantico train robbery will not  
 exceed \$5,000; most of the stolen cash,  
 drafts and bonds having been recov-  
 ered.

Further details of the earthquake  
 at Sakata, Japan, show there was a  
 succession of violent shocks, which  
 destroyed nearly three thousand  
 houses, killed two hundred and sixty  
 persons and injured a large number  
 of others.

The prison population of the United  
 States advanced 358 per million inhabi-  
 tants during the last census period,  
 the increase being greatest in those  
 states containing the largest city popu-  
 lation. There is now one saloon for  
 every 250 inhabitants in 257 most popu-  
 lous cities.

The consumption of all kinds of  
 liquor in the United States in 1850  
 averaged 4.05 gallons per inhabitant;  
 in 1892 it was 17.04 gallons—more  
 than a fourfold increase. In 1874 the  
 per capita consumption of whiskey  
 was the same as today—1-2 gallons.  
 Wine-drinking has remained station-  
 ary, but beer-drinking has more than  
 doubled.

Tammany's army on its official pay-  
 roll foots up 14,698. Of this number  
 7,362 receive salaries of over \$1,000 a  
 year, and the salaries of about a thou-  
 sand range from \$2,000 to \$25,000.  
 Tammany controls 30,000 or 40,000  
 votes in a compact body and the ex-  
 penditure of nearly \$40,000,000 a year  
 raised by taxation. It is no child's  
 play to break down such an organiza-  
 tion. Tammany is about to make its  
 greatest effort, and the reform ele-  
 ments opposing it will have to do the  
 same.

Lord Rosebery, the English prime  
 minister, made in important speech  
 yesterday. The czar of Russia, he  
 remarked, would enjoy in history a  
 reputation as a victor in peace not  
 less undisputed than the reputation  
 Caesar and Napoleon enjoyed as con-  
 querors. The premier extolled the  
 czar's absolutely conscientious devo-  
 tion to truth in diplomatic as well as  
 in private matters. Great Britain  
 has the greatest possible interest in  
 the continuation of the czar's life and  
 health, because if he should be re-  
 moved the greatest guarantee of the  
 peace of the world would disappear.

Mrs. Cleveland to Christen the  
 Ship.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 26.—Informa-  
 tion was received yesterday stating  
 that Mrs. Cleveland, wife of president  
 Cleveland, had consented to christen  
 the new passenger steamer St. Louis,  
 which is almost completed at the  
 Cramp ship-yard in Philadelphia. The  
 exercises are scheduled to take place  
 November 9. A magnificent dinner  
 service, valued at nearly \$20,000, and  
 paid for by popular subscription from  
 the mercantile houses of this city, will  
 be given to the vessel.
