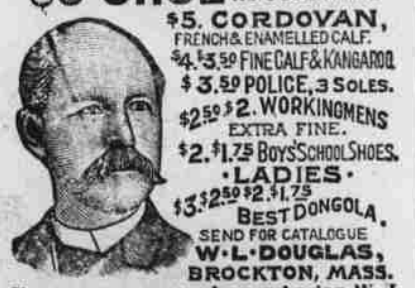

NEW ENGLAND STORM-SWEPT.

Six Inches of Snowfall and Great Damage is Done.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 8.—The wreckage of shipping and property, as reported from various points in New England, and aggregating several hundred thousand dollars in value, is the ruinous trail the terrific storm that has raged in this section of the country for the past thirty-six hours has left behind it. Great damage was done in this city, many houses which had stepped on "live" wires having been shocked to death, or shot afterward to put them out of misery. Great ruin was also wrought in Providence, R. I., where branches of pendent electric lines women truly endeavored the lives of pedestrians. At Salem six inches of snow has fallen, and the telegraph lines are all down.
