

Ghouls Caught at Work.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 24.—In the act of robbing graves in Oak Grove cemetery five students of the university medical college of this city were caught at midnight last night. Residents discovered the party of ghouls at work and blockaded the entrance with wagons and carriages, standing guard with revolvers and shotguns. These men had been on the alert for something of the kind, as several graves in the cemetery have recently been robbed.

The police arrested A. E. Zimmerman, who was guarding the team that was to receive the dead body, and seized his companions, all of whom are juniors. Zimmerman declared the ghoulish work had the sanction of the college faculty.

Lashes and Eyebrows.

Derivation of "Grass Widow."

The phrase "grass widow," or rather "grace widow," for the first has no foundation in fact, and is simply a barbarism or fungus which has attached itself to the English language. "Grace widow" is a term for one who becomes a widow by grace or favor, not of necessity, as by death or originated in the earlier ages of European civilization, when divorcees were granted but seldom, and wholly by authority of the Catholic church. When such decree was granted to a woman the papal rescript stated "Vidua de gratia," which interpreted is "widow of grace."

In the French it would read "Veuve de grace," which in England gives "widow of grace," or "grace widow."

A Vast Treasure Stolen

Moukden was up to 200 years ago the capital of China. Since that time \$5,000,000 a year has been stored there. The Japanese wanted to get this vast sum of \$1,000,000,000. But a strange story comes from Moukden. When the Japanese reach Moukden to possess themselves of the fabulous fortunes accumulated there they will not find the billions of taels, supposed to be safely stored in Moukden's great vaults. The treasury, according to the story, is empty now and has been so for years. Some one has removed the hoarded wealth and this theft of the price of empires has remained undiscovered, thanks to the confidence reposed by the superstitious Chinese in the protecting power of their many gods.

A Big Bond Issue for the Southern Railway.

The banking house of J. S. Morgan & Co., London, will shortly issue four million pounds sterling of 5 per cent. mortgage bonds redeemable in 1894, of the Southern railway company. There will be a general mortgage of \$4,000,000, (\$120,000,000) but 16,000,000 pounds thereof will be issued in exchange for old bonds and 4,000,000 pounds be reserved for issue in annual blocks. The 4,000,000 to be issued will probably be put out immediately at the price fixed, 88.

He Was Beheaded.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Nov. 24.—It was an awful sight that the coroner's jury had to look at this evening. Frank Harton was found by the side of the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad, four miles from here, with his head cut off and his body horribly mangled. He had been in this city with a pocketful of money on a spree, and is thought to have been murdered and robbed. The police have a clue to the murderer.

Terrible Epidemics at Detroit.

Ravages of small pox and diphtheria have thrown Detroit into a partial panic. The spread of the latter disease particularly has been rapid. There are several hundred cases.
