Every bushel of grain which left New York for Europe last year was carried under a foreign flag.

Canada has arranged in London for a loan of \$12,500,000 to continue its work of canal enlargement and general improvement.

It is estimated that the syndicate which brought the recent issue of bonds will realize a profit of \$2,000. 000 in the transaction.

One of the needed currency reforms is a system of bank examination that will prevent an \$1800 book-keeper from stealing \$354,000 by the daily falsification of accounts, as in the case of the Shoe and Leather bank of New York.

The eighteen provinces of China are loosely held together by an administrative policy at Pakin which is nearing an end. The empire is evidently about to break up.

Large ships can get within 140 miles of Pekin, China. In winter the river is closed by ice and though the United States has a fleet of five ships in those waters, two must seek a safe winter harbor 385 miles from the Chinese capital. 




