Railroad News.

At Wilmington yesterday, pursuant to a decree of the circuit court in the case of the Baltimore trust and guarantee company, trustee, against the Wilmington, Chadbourn and Conway railroad, Col. John D. Taylor, special master sold at public auction the Wilmington, Chadbourn and Conway railway. The first bid was \$50,000, made by Warren G. Elliott. W. S. O'B. Robinson bid off \$51,000 and Mr Elliott bid \$53,000, and it was knocked down to him for Mr. B. F. Newcomer, of Baltimore. The sale includes 53 miles of railway running from Conway, S. C., to Chadbourn, N. C., and thence to Hub, Columbus county. All the locomotives, cars, shops, warehouses, depots, lands, franchises, right of way, and all belongings of the road go with it. The terms were cash. The road becomes a part of the Atlantic Coast line.
