A new commander has been appointed
for the Chinese army, and if he knows
his business he will proceed to negoti-
ate a treaty of peace as soon as possible.

Within the last few days buyers of
oranges have been active in California.
News of the disaster to the crop
in Florida has resulted in an advance of
\$1 a box.

Thefts of valuable miniatures from
the Vatican library at Rome have been
detected. Among the objects taken
are 58 miniatures made in 1,100. The
miniatures have all been sold to
foreigners.

Col. Breckinridge is being greeted
with "a beggarly account of empty
benches" on his present lecturing
tour. In other words he is learning
that the country has no use for him
except as a putrid reminiscence.

It is reported that the governor of
Bitlis, Armenia, who commanded the
military operations in the district,
where so many outrages have been
reported, has been assassinated by an
Armenian, who afterwards committed
suicide.

It is reported on what is con-
sidered good authority that governor
Mitchell, of Florida, has revoked the
executive writ issued by him on the
requisition of governor Hogg, of
Texas, for the extradition of Henry
M. Flagler, one of the Standard oil
trust directors.

The Belgian government has pro-
hibited the importation of live cattle
from the United States, on the ground
that pleuro-pneumonia prevails in this
country. This closes all the ports of
continental Europe against American
cattle and beef products and leaves to
the exporter only the British market
which in its present condition is not a
desirable one. This is in addition to
the embargo on dressed beef and
packed goods which has been in force
in most of the European countries for
some time.

The income tax law is in effect now,
but there is no provision for collecting
it and the treasury department is very
much embarrassed at that fact. The
commissioner of internal revenue had
fully intended that the army of deputy
internal revenue collectors should
begin the great work of collecting the
returns, which must be all filed in the
treasury department on or before
March 1. The commissioner is at a
loss to know what course to pursue
under the circumstances.

The death of ex-senator Fair, Cali-
fornia's multi-millionaire, has caused
a great deal of talk because in his will
he left his son none of his \$40,000,000.
This son's legal advisers propose a
plan by which he can contest his
father's will and not jeopardize his
interests by running foul of the for-
feiture clause. The scheme is for Fair's
two daughters to guarantee that if
the brother loses the suit and forfeits
his share they shall equally share
with him in the remaining two-thirds
of the trust revenue.

The Kentucky treasury is practically

More revenue must be had by the
government. The receipts from cus-
toms under the new tariff are improv-
ing, but not as fast as the treasury
officials estimated. The administration
is now considering whether congress
shall be called upon to provide more
income. The receipts for the last six
months have been \$28,500,000 less
than the expenditures. During that
period the total amount of duty re-
ceived from sugar was only \$2,500,000.
There is a proposed increase of \$1 a
barrel upon beer and malt liquors.
No immediate relief will come from
sugar or distilled spirits.

There is much talk about pension
funds. Last year nearly 5,000 cases
were examined, and 300 persons were
recommended for prosecution, of whom
194 were convicted. The letter in-
cluded twenty notaries, thirty-two at-
torneys and thirty-seven witnesses,
and eighteen impersonators of claim-
ants and eleven impostors were dis-
covered. But of soldiers and soldiers'
widows only thirty-nine were found to
be guilty of fraud upon the govern-
ment. That is to say, in a list of
966,000 pensioners only one in about
25,000 turned out to be dishonest.

KILLED 15,000.

Story of the Awful Round-Up by Turkish
Troops.

New and startling light is thrown
on the Armenian horrors. The Arme-
nians, oppressed by Kurds and Turks,
said they could not pay taxes to both
the Kurds and the government. Plun-
dered and oppressed by the Kurds,
they resisted them; there were some
killed. Then false reports were sent
to Constantinople that the Armenians
were in arms in rebellion.

Orders were sent to exterminate
them, root and branch. The order
read before the army collected in
haste from all the cities of eastern
Turkey was: "Whoever spares man,
woman or child is disloyal."

The region was surrounded by sol-
diers of the army, and 30,000 Kurds
also were massed there. Then they
advanced toward a centre, driving in
the people like a flock of sheep. They
continued thus to advance for days.

No quarter was given, no mercy
shown. Men, women, children were
shot down and butchered like sheep.
When they were set upon in this way
some tried to save their lives and re-
sisted in self defense, while those who
could fled in all directions, but the
majority were slain.

The most probable estimate was
15,000 killed, 35 villages plundered,
razed and burned. Women were out-
raged and then butchered. A priest
was taken to the roof of his church
and hacked to pieces and set on fire.

A large number of women and girls
collected in a church were kept for
days, violated by the brutal soldiers
and then murdered. It is said the
number was so large that their blood
flowed out of the church door. The
soldiers contended over a beautiful
girl; they wanted to preserve her,
but she, too, was killed.

Every effort is being made and will
be made to falsify the facts and pull
the wool over the eyes of European
government, but the bloody tale will
finally be known; the most horrible,
it seems that the nineteenth
century has known.

The other day, while several hun-
dred soldiers were returning from the
seat of war, one was heard to say
that he alone, with his own hand, had
killed thirty women. Some who seem
to have some shame for their atrocious
deeds say: "What could we do; we
were under orders?"
