

## THE LEGISLATURE

TODAY'S PROCEEDINGS IN BOTH BRANCHES.

The Vote for State Treasurer is Canvassed and Declared.

### SENATE.

In the senate today principal the new bills were to reduce expenses of State Guard; to repeal tax or license of piano and organ dealers; to reduce salaries of state and county officers; to reduce official bond of county officers of Pitt; to inquire into the case of Mrs. Pattie D. B. Arrington; to change the date of Thanksgiving day to one earlier; to abolish county boards of education; to regulate the business of life insurance; to authorize Alleghany Ashe and Watauga to assist in building a railway. Effort was made to adopt a resolution instructing senators and representatives to vote against all bills which did not advocate free coinage of silver and abolition of all banks of issue. It was referred.

### HOUSE.

In the house speaker Walser presided. Petitions were sent in concerning seven election contests. The contest in one of these is J. E. Person, of Wayne. A resolution was introduced urging senators and representatives to secure the election of senators by the people. The principal bills introduced were to amend the charter of Winston; to repeal the provision of the code regarding public printing; to repeal the railway commission act; to abolish the death penalty; to strike out the provision limiting auctioneers fees to 2-1-2 per cent. At noon the senate and the house went in joint session to canvass and declare the vote for state treasurer. Forty-seven senators and 114 representatives were present and president Doughton of the senate presided.

### BEAT HIS WIFE'S LOVER.

Traveled 2200 Miles to Give a man a Thrashing.

NORRISTOWN, Pa., Jan. 14.—Senator Samuel B. Newell, made an assault with brass knuckles today upon E. S. McPherson, agent in this city for the Northwestern life insurance company. Newell claims McPherson has been criminally intimate with his wife, McPherson formerly resided at Central City, and was befriended by Newell, who a well known politician. Two years ago McPherson left Colorado, and since then has been corresponding with the senator's wife. Newell got hold of some of the letters, and learned that McPherson was in Norristown, so he left Denver on Saturday night with the intention of coming 2200 miles to give McPherson a severe beating.

On reaching Philadelphia Newell registered under an assumed name, and disguised himself by having his mustache dyed black and donning a wig. Thus prepared to surprise his foe, he knocked at the door of McPherson's office.

When McPherson responded the senator landed his right on the insurance agent's head, following with a left-hander on his face. As Newell wore steel knuckles McPherson was severely punished in the short time the two men were together. They are both about 40 years of age. Lawyer Jerry B. Lazzerelle rushed in from an adjoining room to assist McPherson but the senator was too active and too powerful to be subdued by Lazzerelle and McPherson. Two other men, who heard the cries for help, rushed in and separated the men, and McPherson disappeared, probably to hunt a surgeon.

Some minutes later a policeman took Newell into custody and escorted him to the police station. As no one appeared against him he was discharged from custody. Before leaving he narrated the story of the entanglement, in support of which he exhibited several of McPherson's letters to Mrs. Newell. He left for Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, where his wife is visiting relatives. She was unaware of his visit here.

## PLANING MILLS.

The Mills Manufacturing Company's New Departure.

There is to be still another large Raleigh industry. It is good to see them start and the Visaron delights to publish them. This latest movement towards Raleigh's industrial advancement is the Mills manufacturing company's planing mills.

The company has lately increased its capital stock for this purpose and has contracted with another firm for one fifty horse-power engine, two sixty horse-power boilers, dry kiln, etc., machinery for the plant. The machinery is expected to arrive daily and large sheds for saw mills purposes are now being built. The company will do a large business, sawing, drying and drawing lumber for the northern markets.

The capacity of the mill will be from 10,000 to 15,000 feet of prepared lumber per day and will furnish employment to a number of hands. It is expected that work will commence within sixty days, at least.
