TODAY'S PROCEEDINGS IN BOTH BRANCHES.

Butler and Pritchard Elected U. S. Senators.

SENATE

In the senate the most important new bills were: ,To award the public printing by contract,

To exempt cotton mills and iron furnaces from taxation if built by private corporations.

To enlarge the jurisdiction of mag-

To reduce salaries of state officers. A bill passed allowing a widow to draw during widowhood the pensions which the former husband drew.

Bill to regulate the rate of interest was tabled.

A joint committee of 20 was raised to investigate public expenditures, particularly in the agricultural department, the bureau of labor statisties and the geological survey.

A resolution appointing a joint committee of 26 on election law and county government passed 21 reading.

At noon the election of senators was held Fortune nominated Leter C. Pritchard, Adams nominated Lee S. Overman. Mewborne nominated Marion Butler and Abell nominated Thomas W. Mason. The vote was 43 for Butler and Pritehard, 4 for Overman and Mason.

HOUSE.

At the session of the house the principal bills introduced were the follow-

To aid public schools by local assessments.

borers' liens a priority over mortgages.

To establish an additional term of court for Edgecombe county.

To allow special elections in Cleveland county on the question whether liquor shall be manufactured or not.

To establish a criminal court circuit for Rutherford, Henderson and Polk counties. To amend the code so that the plaintiff or defendant in case a demurrer is overruled can introduce further evidence.

The special committee on elections was also made the special committee on county government and all bills on those subjects are to be referred to it.

A bill passed making \$50 the fee for the charter of all corporations save benevolent, educational and religious, by the legislature.

A bill also passed fixing the fees of solicitors in the case of appointment of receivers of the estates of infants.

A bill to reduce the bonds of the officers of Pitt county other than the sheriff was tabled.

At noon the house went into the election of senators.

Hunter of Madison nominated Jeter C. Prichard, for the short term, and Turner of Mitchell seconded the nomination. Ray of Macon nominated Lee S. Overman and Robinson of Anson seconded the nomination. The vote was Pritchard, 66; Overman 41.

Mitchell of Franklin nominated Marion Butler for the long term, and Phillips of Pitt seconded the mo-

Monroe of Wayne nominated Thos. W Mason, and Grizzard of Halifax and Smith of Gates seconded the nomination. The vote was Butler 66, Mason 41.

William H. Worth was sworn in as state treasurer, associate justice Walter Clark administering the oath.

Awful Tales of Suffering from Nebraska-Help Needed.

GREELET CENTRE, Neb., Jan. 21 .-The distress in this part of the state is appalling No picture of the suffering has been overdrawn, and a great many sad cases have been suppressed. Thus far stock has lived by pasturing on the dry grass, and there has been but little cold weather and

Hundreds of families have nothing to eat and no fuel, and children are so nearly naked that they are kept from school. At least one-fifth of the people of this county have become county charges, which has depleted the treasury and depreciated county paper until it is not worth more than half its face value, and is still going down. It is impossible for the people to care for the destitute, and unless a large amount of outside assistance is received at once some of the worthy farmers and their families will perish The people mostly need clothing, and anything in that line cannot fail to alleviate the suffering.

Some of the best farmers, whose lands are unincumbered, are as destitute as tenants, because they cannot realize on any kind or class of securities. A great many of the floating population left the state last fall, and all who are here are actual residents, most of them owning their homes. All the hogs and salable cattle bave been sold and shipped away, and they have only to depend upon charity, and if that fails, it is certain death.
