## ALL ABOUT BOOKS.

The Educational Committee to Meet Again This Afternoon.

This afternoon the joint educational committee will meet again to hear argument on the book question, that is whether each county shall adopt its own text books or whether they shall be adopted by the state, as has hitherto been the case.

Various publishing companies were represented, the university publishing company, by J. C. L. Harris; American book company, by D. L. Russell and F. H. Basbee; Ginn & Co., by T. R. Parnell and W. N. Jones. This is the firm which is urging a change of the law. E. G. Harrell made a statement that the change of the law proposed by the bill would cost an average of one dollar per child attending public schools, or for Wake county alone \$15,000, or \$300,000 for the state, if all the counties make the change.

This afternoon the committee will probably finish hearing the argument and reach a decision by tomorrow. It is understood that the committee will report favorably on the bill.

The Southern railroad will sell round trip tickets at greatly reduced prices. The sale commences on Feb. 16 and closes the 21. The tickets will be good until the 26th.

The trains were generally delayed today by the snow. It is reported that in some cuts on the railroads the snow has blown and drifted into ditches to a depth of over 3 feet.

## THE WEATHER

### The Conditions and the Forecast.

For North Carolina: Thursday fair warmer.

Local forecast for Raleigh and vicinity: Thursday fair, slightly warmer. Nights will continue very cold for some time.

Local data for 24 hours ending at 8 a. m. today. Maximum temperature 28; minimum temperature 14; rainfall, 0.32.

The storm yesterday central off the south Atlantic coast has moved with great rapidity along the coast to New England, increasing intensely. It is still snowing at New York, Philadelphia and Buffalo. It is also snowing this morning at Cincinnati and Nashville from local causes. Elsewhere it is fair. The pressure is generally low on the Atlantic coast and high with a moderate cold wave west of the Mississippi river the conditions are favorable for the continued flow of air from west to east so that the temperature will rise slowly in this vicinity, the nights will continue cold for sometime. Mean temperature at Raleigh February 1st to 12th, 1895, is 26 degrees, the normal for the same period is 44 degrees.
