The Conditions and the Forecast.

For North Carolina: Thursday fair warmer. Local forecast for Raleigh and

vicinity: Thursday fair, slightly warmer. Nights will continue very cold for some time.

Local data for 24 hours ending at 8 a. m. today. Maximum temperature 28: minimum temperature 14; rainfall,

The storm yesterday central off the south Atlantic coast has moved with great rapidity along the coast to New England, increasing intensely. It is still snowing at New York, Philadelphia and Buffalo. It is also snowing this morning at Cincinnati and Nashville from local causes. Elsewhere it is fair. The pressure is generally low on the Atlantic coast and high with a moderate cold wave west of the Mississippi river the conditions are favorable for the continued flow of air from west to east so that the temperature will rise slowly in this vicinity, the nights will continue cold for sometime. Mean temperature at Raleigh February 1st to 12th, 1895, is 26 degrees, the normal for the same period is 44 degrees.
