Postmaster-general Wilson is said, yesterday placed his resignation, as a member of the cabinet, in the hands of president Cleveland.

Without some concessions, or any advance in price of sugar, another year will see a state of affairs direful and disastrous, even with the most prosperous of Cuban planters.

The Philadelphia papers are boastfully pointing to the fact that fully 20 per cent of the assessable property in that city is owned by women; but they do not tell us the proportion of wives who are holding the property of husbands to keep it out of the reach of creditors.

The official utterances of the German war minister are unusually pacific this year; but the fact remains that more than 3,000 workmen are kept engaged night and day in making cartridges and other ammunition. Forts along both the eastern and western boundaries have been newly equipped.

In order to foster the butter trade the Canadian government has offered to buy the winter butter made by its citizens for shipment to England, paying for it 20s a pound. The opposition papers say this sudden development of paternalism is intended to secure the farmers' vote.

A fire broke out in one of the large hotels of Philadelphia last week and the army of servant girls, instead of showing panic, fell into their places instantly as had been taught in a fire drill, and extinguished the fire before the engines arrived. Few of the guests knew that anything unusual had happened.

In North Carolina last year in round numbers 164,000 acres of land produced while 695,000 acres in wheat produced \$2,500,000. In other words, the money value of wheat per acre in the above estimates is \$3.25; of oats, \$4.95, and of hay \$15.75. The average money value of an acre of the combined crops is a fraction less than \$7.

The officers and soldiers of the salvation army turned out in full force last night at New York and gave a rousing "blood fire" farewell reception to their official head, Gen. Booth, who has just finished a general inspection of the army in the United States, and who sails today for England in the Paris of the American line.

An event of far greater importance to civilization than royal successions and squabbles over the partition of Africa will take place on June 20 next, when the Baltic and North Sea canal will be formally opened by Kaiser Wilhelm to the world's commerce. The principal nations have been invited to take part in the ceremony, and the mercantile and warlike navies of the world will be represented.

The age limit retirement tomorrow of Rear Admiral James A. Greer, of the United States navy, will witness the promotion to that high grade of Commodore William A. Kirkland, who has of late been in command of the European station. The newly fledging Rear Admiral has given forty-five years of his life to the service of his country upon the sea.

BAPTISED UNDER ICE.

Converts Scantly Clad, but the Pastor Wore a Rubber Suit.

MEDIA, Pa., Feb. 27.—Silver lake at the foot of Dr. Kingston Goddard's lawn, at Morton, was the scene today of an interesting religious ceremony, conducted by the colored Baptists of that place.

The lake was ice-bound but that did not chill the ten candidates for baptism. A hole at one edge of the lake, eight feet square had been cut, and six young women and four men stepped into the freezing waters and were immersed by Rev. Willis' assisted by Rev. Thomas D. Evans, of Philadelphia.

The baptism was to have taken place two weeks ago, but on account of the blizzard was postponed until today. A great crowd gathered to witness the frigid ceremony. The converts baptized stood the ordeal bravely, and some of the women came out of the lake shouting and clapping their hands.

The only dress worn by them was a robe and a large cape of white flannel.

Negro Immigrants Not Welcome.

MARINI, Mexico, Feb. 27.—The second installment of 1,000 negroes from Alabama reached here tonight and will proceed to the land they are to colonize tomorrow. They are in a very happy frame of mind and spend their time singing plantation songs. The newspapers are appealing to the government to put a stop to the colonization of negroes in Mexico. It is claimed by some of the leading newspaper men that the new colonists are liable to incite a revolution against President Diaz's administration.
