Rhode Island and Michigan will hold state elections next month.

The improvement in business is likely to be slow, but it will be safe.

In two recent murder trials in New York the bills for extras were respectively \$325,678 and \$21,449.

The organization of the new silver party has proceeded as far as the selection of leaders, and as soon as it gets some followers it will be ready for business.

The recent U. S. pension legislation, advancing all pensioners receiving less than six dollars a month up to that rating, will affect 40,000 cases and involve an increase of \$1,500,000.

At least 75 per cent of the book manuscripts submitted to publishers are never printed, and if the number that ought not to have been printed is counted in it will be seen that literature is chiefly a voiceless waste of paper and ink.

The improved order of the Knights of Pythias composed of German-Americans who was dissatisfied with the action of the supreme lodge, K. of P., in declaring against the use of the German ritual, seems to be growing steadily, both here in Washington and throughout the country.

A man in Connecticut has been arrested for destroying his wife's dresses, which he declared were too gay. His defense is that the dresses were his, as he paid for them, and that a man can not be denied the right to destroy his own property. This gives the courts a new nut to crack.

The condition of ex-president Harrison, who has been critically sick at Indianapolis, is much improved. The alarming congestion of the lungs is rapidly dissipating, and the physicians announce that there need be no further concern for the ex-president's recovery.

Rev. Dr. Talmage presided in a New York theatre Sunday and in his prayer said: "We thank thee that the congress of the nation has departed, and that many of those who represented the people in public offices will no more represent them. We pray thee that you will forgive them for the damage they have done this nation."

Three negroes were shot at New Orleans. They were employed in loading vessels. This is the latest labor trouble. The military are now on duty. Trouble was expected to occur any moment between the whites and the blacks. White laborers were trying to clear the levee of the negroes. The police were unable to prevent an encounter.

There have been dissensions for a long time past among the members of the Twenty-third Street Baptist church at New York due to the objection of the more conservative members of the sensational character of the sermons preached during the last five years by their pastor, Rev. Thomas Dixon, Jr. Sunday Mr. Dixon announced his determination to sever his connection with the church and to found a new one on a broad and popular platform. He will enter an independent field of work and says he is looking forty years ahead. He has

contemplated the step for over a year and is preparing for the twentieth century. He declares his purpose to be to evangelize politics and attract the masses who do not go to church. He has undertaken what to use a slang phrase, may be termed "an army contract." Mr. Dixon, who is only 31 years old, was born in North Carolina. He was admitted to the bar, but believing it to be his duty to preach the gospel he became a minister. His first pastorates were at Raleigh and Goldsboro. He went to New York 7 years ago. In 1892 he preached a number of sermons denouncing Ingersoll. He recently defended Thomas C. Platt from the pulpit against the attacks of Rev. Dr. Parkhurst.

Massachusetts does not after all take kindly to the idea of enfranchising the feminine sex though the women of that state are probably the most intelligent in the country. A woman suffrage bill has been defeated in the lower branch of the legislature by a majority of 40; and last year a similar bill was defeated in the other branch. This is discouraging to the friends of the cause, but they have the right of perseverance, and the time may come when Massachusetts will consent to imitate Colorado in this matter.

Over 2000 Chinese Slain.

Tokio, March 11.—Almost daily victories crown the Japanese arms in China. General Nodza reports that his army attacked the Chinese at Ten-Chan-Tai yesterday morning. The Japanese advanced from three directions. A hot artillery fire was opened at 7 a. m., and under its cover the three bodies of troops stormed the town. The Chinese numbered 10,000 or more. At first they fought stubbornly, but eventually broke and ran, throwing down their arms and making no effort to save standards or baggage. Most of the Chinese fled to the northwest.
